



MOVEMENTS OF THE UNION ARMIES SINCE THE SURRENDER OF LEE.

Though the surrender of the Army of Northern Virginia is an accomplished fact, our army is not idle, but whatever force is necessary to complete the entire work is even now in rapid motion. The Twenty-fourth Army Corps, says the New York Times, a body of men that can out march any other body in the world, moved on Sunday for Lynchburg, and just as General Grant left Burkeville for City Point on Tuesday afternoon, he received a dispatch announcing the occupation of that city by our troops without opposition.

As soon as Sheridan had rested his men and horses he moved directly for Danville, and has ere this occupied the place, as it was but seventy-five miles distant. This places his force directly in Johnston's rear, and cuts off his hope of escape. Gen. Sherman moved from Goldsboro on Monday last for Raleigh and between Sherman and Sheridan the public may judge of Johnston's chances of success. Important news from these columns is hourly expected.

The greater portion of the Army of the Potomac will speedily return to the vicinity of Richmond and Petersburg, to await further developments. The soldiers are all happy, and anticipate an early discharge and retirement to their homes.

CONDITION OF MR. SEWARD.

The side of Mr. Seward's face injured by his fall has been placed in wires instead of bandages, since which time the swelling has become reduced, and now he does not suffer so much pain. He is unable to leave his bed as yet, and is generally more easy in the day time than during the night. As talking is very painful to him, owing to the injury of his jaw, he uses a slate and pencil to communicate with others.

OFFICERS OF THE CITY BATTALION CAPTURED AT AMELIA COURT HOUSE.

The City (35th Virginia) Battalion was among the last troops that left the Richmond front under Ewell, the whole of whose command were captured near Amelia Court House, by Gen. Sheridan, with the assistance of the 6th and 8th corps, on Thursday, the 6th instant. CAPTURED CONFEDERATE OFFICERS.

Mr. S. E. Brown, of the Christian Commission, writing from Wilson's Station, has kindly sent us the following list of Confederate officers, who are now prisoners in our hands. The recent capture of some of them has already been mentioned, but, for the most part, upon rumor. Mr. Brown sends this list at the request of Brigadier General Hunton.

HUGHES ARTILLERY BATTALION.

Hughes' Artillery Battalion, Longstreet's corps, Army Northern Virginia, when surrendered at Appomattox, numbered 247 men, besides the battalion and company officers. Smith's battery numbered 60 men; Moody's 41; Parker's 52; Taylor's 52 and Ficklin's 42.

THE FIRST NEW YORK MOUNTED RIFLES.

We mentioned Saturday a recent successful raid of the First New York Mounted Lancers, Colonel Sumner, into Northern North Carolina. This gallant regiment arrived in the city yesterday morning, direct from Suffolk. Men and horses were in fine condition, and though somewhat travel stained showed otherwise no marks of their recent heavy marching and fighting.

FROM NORTH CAROLINA.

The Herald's Newbern despatches of the 8th instant state that the entire re-equipping of General Sherman's army had been completed, and that it was ready to enter upon a new campaign for the sudden extinguishment of General Johnston's military power, if that rebel chieftain shall choose to offer any further resistance after hearing of Lee's surrender. The news of the capture of Richmond of course caused great rejoicing in Newbern. The country on the south side of the Neuse river, be-

tween Newbern and Goldsboro', is entirely cleared of armed rebels; but on the north side of that stream there are some prowling bands. One of these, on the 7th inst., captured and burned a steamer and two barges, laden with supplies for Sherman's troops, on their way up the river. This is the only interruption which Gen. Sherman's communications have suffered. General Mower has succeeded Gen. Williams as commander of the Twentieth corps, in Sherman's army.

TELEGRAPHIC ITEMS.

AFFAIRS AT GALVESTON.

NEW YORK, April 14.—The steamer Corsica, from Nassau on the 10th instant, arrived here to-day. The blockade runner Banchee, with 1000 bales of cotton, arrived at Nassau on the 30th ult. from Galveston. She reports Galveston as garrisoned by 1200 troops. Twelve Federal ships were off the bar, and six steamers had sailed recently for Havana from Galveston.

THE SIEGE OF MOBILE.

NEW ORLEANS, April 6.—Advices from the army about Mobile to the 4th instant, state that the water communications between the Spanish Fort and Mobile were cut off by a battery established above the fort. The rebel communications with Mobile are now entirely suspended. The siege progresses favorably.

THE REBEL FORCES IN KENTUCKY.

LEXINGTON, KY., April 13th.—Gen. Palmer is at Eminence, Ky., for the purpose of receiving the surrender of all the Rebel forces in the State including Col. Jessie's command. Those who will not surrender will be declared outlaws, and the people will be called upon to hunt them down. A Lieutenant and seventy-one men surrendered yesterday to Gen. Hobson.

THANKSGIVING IN WISCONSIN.

MADISON, Wis., April 12.—Gov. Lewis has appointed Thursday as a day of thanksgiving and rejoicing over our late victories. The Legislature adjourned sine die on Monday.

THE PORT OF KEY WEST.

The President has issued a supplementary proclamation in regard to the Port of Key West, as follows:

WHEREAS, by my proclamation of this date, the Port of Key West, in the State of Florida, was inadvertently included among those which are not open to commerce,

NOW, therefore, be it known that I, ABRAHAM LINCOLN, President of the United States, do hereby declare and make known that the said port of Key West is and shall remain open to foreign and domestic commerce, upon the same conditions by which that commerce has heretofore been governed.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand, and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

Done at the City of Washington, the eleventh day of April, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, and of the independence of the United States of America, the eighty-ninth. ABRAHAM LINCOLN.

GENERAL LEE.—The position of General Lee at the time of his surrender must have been saddening indeed. His wife was within the Union lines. The great army which his genius organized and which he had led upon so many hard-fought fields, was beaten, dispersed, ruined. Nothing awaited him but complete humiliation. The penalties he suffers are the just consequences of his guilt; yet a generous people cannot fail to sympathize with a fallen hero in this hour of his supreme anguish and mortification.—*Albany Journal*, 11th.
