The following address and resolutions are published under the direction of the tobacco asso. ciation of this city:

To the Planters and Tobacco Dealers of Virginia and North Carolina:

The undersigned, buyers, sellers, and inspectors of tobacco, having been requested to address you in behalf of the tobacco trade of this city upon a subject affecting alike your interests and their own, would earnestly call your attention to a statement of facts, with a hope that a knowledge of them on your part will lead to a removal of the complaints now existing in the markets of Europe and those of our own contry, which are known to us to operate prejudicially, and if not corrected will continue most injuriously to affect our mutual interests.

It is not alone owing to the detericated quality of our great staple, but more in consequence of its bad management, that the high standard which Virginia and North Carolina tobacco heretofore held in all the markets of the world has suffered so great depreciation. For some years past there have been growing complaints of tue bad assorting and mixed prizing in hogsheads, and the evil has grown to such enormity that it is no unc mmon occurrence for large reclamations to be made upon the buyer for foreign or domestic orders because of the failure of the tobacco, when shipped, to correspond with the sample previously forwarded, and by which the purchase had been made. In consequence of carelessness and negligence on the part of some, and unscrupulousness of false packing and nesting on the part of others, the trade have been compelled to insist upon a change in the mode of packing and sampling every package of tobacco offered for sale in this market, and with unanimity have adopted the regulations herewith published as a means of self-protection against the liability of the heavy risks incurred. If we would restore the reputation which our staple formerly held, and challedge that confidence would restore the reputation which our staple formerly held, and challenge that confidence which is necessary to retain for it a competing demand at home and abroad, it is indispensable that the system of false and fraudulent packing by the unscrupulous be frowned upon and approach.

ing by the unscrupulous be frowned upon and exposed.

It is therefore earnestly urged upon all to abandon the practice of packing tobacco of different length, color and quality indiscriminately in the same hogshead, and where this in unavailable let there be a plain indication of the different kinds, with the name of the planter or repriser distinctly marked upon every package, that the seller may accurately represent it, and, claiming the confidence of the buyer, may demand its full market value. We would recommend to the planters the freer use of domestic manures in the cultivation of their tobacco crop as the surest means of securing that quality which gives special preference to the growth of Virginia and North Carolina; and with good management, neat handling, and uniformity in packing, they may be assured of a continued and appreciative demand, the world over, at remunerative prices.

The committee to whom were referred certain resolutions adopted at a meeting of the Tobacco Association held on the 27th day of January last have considered the same, and beg leave to report the following:

1. Resolved, That from and after the first day of March next all hogsheads and other packages

1. Resolved, That from and after the first day of March next all hogsheads and other packages of leaf tobacco offered for sale in this market shall be broken not less than four times, and oftener when in the opinion of the inspector it is necessary to secure a fair and accurate sample, each break to be at as equal distance apart as practicable between the top and bottom of the hogshead or package; and that every sample be composed of nands or bundles drawn in alterhogshead or package; and that every sample be composed of nands or bundles drawn in alternate order from the inner and outer layers of tobacco in each break, and placed in like order in the sample—no more tobacco to be taken from each package than is placed in the sample.

2. Resolved, That it being the duty of the Inspector, with just reference to all interests, properly and fairly to sample all tobacco, there shall be no interference on the part of any person to influence or control any inspector in the faithful discharge of his duty.

3. Resolved, That whilst no legal responsibility attaches to the seller, in the event of failure of any package to correspond with the sample by which such tobacco is sold, still it is understood and agreed that any loss or reclamation claimed in such cases will be entertained by the seller, and it justly made, every effort is due by the seller to secure to the buyer a just indemnity.
