THE "TRICK" OFFICIALLY DENIED AND EXPOSED.

Address of the Republican Executive
Committee.

The state executive committee of the
Republican party of Virginia have noticed

the eligibility of Colonel R. W. Hughes to the
office of governor of Virginia. The time

GRAND REPUBLICAN MASS MEETING IN RICHMOND.

Saturday night next, 25th instant, the
Republicans of Richmond will hold the
mass meeting of the canvass in front of the
Custom-house, on Bank, between Tenth
and Eleventh streets. Such speakers as
Hon. HORACE MAYNARD, of Tennessee;
Colonel ROBERT W. HUGHES, Hon. O.
P. RAMSDELL, General WILLIAMS C.
WICKHAM, and other eminent gentlemen,
will deliver addresses. In addition there will
be a grand display of fire-works, bands of
music, and such other attractive incident-
als as will make this meeting the largest
of the kind ever held in this city.

Our friends from the cities, towns, and
country are respectfully invited and ex-
pected to attend, as well as such of our
opponents as may wish to hear the true
issues of the campaign intelligently and
truthfully discussed.

SANDY STUART'S SPEECH AT AS-
SEMBLY HALL LAST NIGHT.—This
extensive canvassary was numerous
populated last night, on which occasion
Hon. Alexander H. H. Stuart, of
Staunton, was delivered of a nineteen
column speech—the primary object of his
indictment on the nerves and patience of the
people being a desire on the part of the
honorable gentleman to go into training as
a candidate for United States senator from
Virginia, vice John F. Lewis, whose
successor will be elected at the ensuing
meeting of the General Assembly.

The stage was occupied at 8 o'clock by
the members of the state and city com-
mittees, the city legislative committee,
McCann's fine First Regiment band, which
struck up on the approach of the distin-
guished orator, who made his appearance
in company with Colonel Joseph Mayo.
They were greeted with a spontaneous out-
burst of applause.

Colonel Joseph Mayo, jr., introduced
the senator in embryo, who proceeded to
speak his piece.

The campaign bomb-shell projected at
the exposed caps of the K. K. K. by the
unrelenting Valley orator treated of almost
every subject now agitating the breasts of
Virginia politicians, including a scheme,
original with Mr. Stuart, of a compulsory
removal of every colored citizen of the
south and of the United States to some
foreign clime. This proposition, which the
orator very appropriately denominated
"stardling," did not seem to go down very
well, yet it is said that on this hobby Mr.
Stuart expects to get into the United States
senate. At this meeting Messrs. Ould,
Gilman and Dooley also orated. Mr. Ould,
however, entirely dissented from the propo-
sition to make Ishmaels of the colored
people.

"And then the band played," and the

CONSERVATIVE EXCURSION TO PE- TERSBURG.

Preparations have been made
on a grand scale for the temporary removal
at 6 o'clock this evening of a number of
Conservative residents of this city to Pe-
tersburg. A railroad train of considerable
dimensions has been engaged for the ac-
commodation of the numerous unwashed
and untutored sans culottes who are ex-
pected to add interest and dignity to the
occasion by their presence. The train,
after its arrival in Petersburg, will proceed
to the front of Jarratt's Hotel, where the
unwashed will signify their presence by a
series of yells, and those who have any
stamps will strike for the nearest bar-room.
A member of the Kemper Campaign Klub
will be in charge of each coach of the train,
and be its conductor. He will be indicated
by his badge.

REPUBLICAN MEETING AT THE MAISON D'OR.

There was a large
meeting of Republicans last night at the
hotel of Nathan Williams, esq., on Broad
near the corner of Seventh street. Able
and interesting addresses were delivered by
Senator William N. Stevens, of Sussex
county, and Charles J. Malord, esq., of
this city. A brass band attended and
lent interest to the occasion. Mr. Nathan
Williams, who had previously declared his
intention of being an independent candi-
date for the house of delegates in opposi-
tion to the regular nominees of the party
in this city, at this meeting announced
his withdrawal, declaring that he should
do all in his power for the success of the
regular nominees. The declaration was
hailed with lively expressions of satisfac-
tion.

GONE WEST.—The United States senate
committee on internal navigation, consist-
ing of Messrs. Windom and others, having
spent yesterday in an examination of the
ship lock and parts adjacent, determined
the practicability of the proposed exten-
sion of the James river and Kanawha ca-
nals, left this morning for an inspection of
the Chesapeake and Ohio railroad. The
committee were much aided in drawing
correct conclusions in the premises by the
lucid and luminous representations of vari-
ous public spirited and patriotic citizens
of Richmond. The canal, the eastern ter-
minus of which was examined on the interest-
ing occasion alluded to, is about two hun-
dred miles long.
