Appropriations for Forts, Harbors, &c. WASHINGTON, October 23.—The report of General Humphries, chief of engineers, just submitted to the secretary of war, contains the following estimates for the continuous for the next fine leaves for the continuous for the next fine leaves. fortifications named for the next fiscal year: Forts Monroe, \$75,000; McHenry, year: Forts Monroe, \$75,000; McHenry, \$35,000; Washington, \$35,000; Foote, \$3,500. General Humphries also recommends the following appropriations: For mortar batteries, \$100,000; torpedoes, \$300,000; contingencies, \$106,000; purchase of sites, \$100,000. General Humphries gives the following statement of the condition of the coast defenses from Baltimore to the Gulf: ver county, and for a number of years secretary of state of Alabama, died here from Baltimore to the Gulf;

Fort McHenry, Baltimore harbor, operations have been commenced on the large exterior battery, and it is expected to have a sufficient portion of it prepared during the next year to afford cover and magazine room for eight large guns. Fort Carroll is on the outer line of defense of the harbor of Baltimore, is a casemated work, and until the best method of arranging such defences shall have been devised, no expenditures upon it are proposed, other than for its preservation. It has not yet been found practicable to make experiments upon the obstruction of the Potomac river, for which the co-operation of the navy department

Fort Foote, Potomac river, Maryland, forms the inner line of defense of the chan-nel of approach by water to Alexandria, Washington and Georgetown, the site having been purchased and jurisdiction ceded by the legislature of Maryland. The proposed strengthening of this important work commenced in April, 1873, to include the battery north of the fort on Rozier's Bluff. The armament of the fort and battery will comprise guns of the heaviest calibre.

Fort Monroe, Va., has been subjected to numerous repairs.

The forts on the South Atlantic and Gulf coasts have generally been subjected to re-pairs and slight improvements.
