IMPORTANT FROM CUBA. NEW YORK, August 10.—The Herald, of this morning, has important news from Cuba. Its cor-respondent is informed that a demand or request been made by the British government, that a commission shall be authorized to search estates and all places in Cuba, where the importation of Africans is supposed to be sheltered, and that the Spanish government has granted the demand.

The Captain General, previous to receiving or ders for this authorization, searched several estates and took a great many negroes from them.

The present agreement between England and
Spain, as proposed by the former, is as follows:

First, England will consent to the importation in to Cuba of apprentices from Africa, to serve for ten years; second, a new census for every slave in Cuba will be forwarded by a mixed commission who will be authorized to search every estate in the island, so that in future they can ascertain whe ther new slaves have been introduced; third, in fifty years from the date of the acceptance of the proposition and treaty based thereon, the pres slaves and their children will be set free.

FATAL RAILROAD CATASTROPHE.

New York, August 10 .- Two passenger trains on the Camden and Amboy Railroad came in collision yesterday afternoon, and two cars attached to each train were demolished. Five persons were killed and twenty-three injured—seven very seriously. A child of Rev. James Purviance, of Mississippi, had a thigh broken. This dreadful calamity was the result of gross negligence.

THE FISHERIES.—SIGNS OF TROUBLE. WASHINGTON, August 10 .- Intelligence from the fishing grounds, causes uneasiness here. It is stated that fifteen vessels have sailed the ce from eastern ports, fully armed, and manned by officers and crews who are resolved to fight if interfered with in the pursuit of their avocation.
