In the better days of the Republic, it was customary to choose a man for office with some refer acce to his qualifications for the post. Even the respets of Europe select the wisest of their subdespets of Europe select the wisest of their sub-jects for the principal positions in the cabinet and rovernment. If Russia, Austria, Prussia, or any tither absolute power were in the habit of putting ird rate men in places of power and trust, they ould long ago have fallen, as they long ago de erved to fall, before the indignation of a people who have falled of success, because superior physical strength is no match even for a weak govern

nent, when supported by superior intelligence.

The Presidency of the United States is the high est and most bonorable office on the face of th est and most bonorable omes on the tace of the earth. He who earns it by talents and services sthat deserve it, is able to look down upon kings and emperors. He is himself an emperor of Nature's making. He needs no counsellors to steer the bark of state for him. He is not obliged to look to his Cabinet for wisdom or guidance. The President of the United States ought to be like Louis Napoleon, the originator, the leader, the maste pirit of the government. Vast and varied interats are committed to his hands. No man can, ood faith, perform the duties which are devolved nstitution upon the American Executive nless he possess commanding talents, soun udgment and great political experience. It is not the theory nor design of our government that the ident shall be, like an English monarch, a mere puppet in the hands of the ministry. He is himself the real and responsible head of the gov-ernment. Any party which puts a man in the Ex-ecutive chair, to be a blind tool of a superior cabinet minister, commits a base fraud upon c ns and people, and any man who suffers him self to be thus imposed upon the country, is a vile impostor and pretender, who would be willing to sell his native land, or his soul, if he has one, for thirty pieces of silver.
In old times, only the first men were spoken

for the Presidency. George Washington! Why, it is profanation to place in the seat where he sat any but a man pre-eminent for wisdom and virtue mas Jefferson, John Adams, James Madisor all belonged to the race of giants. Think of it! John C. Fremont aspiring to the vacant chair of George Washington! If those aspirations be gratified, the problem of man's capacity for selfgovernment will be so thoroughly settled, that the individual who hereafter announces it as a part of of a west de lunatico inquirendo Who is Fremont? First a naval schoolmaster

then an engineer; then an insubordinate army of-ficer; then an explorer of Rocky Mountains; then for thirty days, a Senator. It is a received axiom, both in civil and military government, that he who would command must first learn to obey.— Has Fremont ever learned that lesson, so indis. pensable in his own particular profession? No ! He was an insubordinate army officer and in coneave the service. Is this your crack soldier? Is he the man to set up as a hero? If he had pos-sessed the military skill of Winfield Scott and the personal prowess of Zachary Taylor, he could never have been trusted with a high position even in military life, until like them he had learned the lesson of discipline and subordination.— Even thea, he could have had no claims to civil onors on account of military distinction. But neither a Scott nor a Taylor; he neve atoned for his mulish and refractory spirit of dis-obedience by any act of military skill and daring Lieut. Schenck of the navy, declares that he did even aid his countrymen in the Indian battles in California, but uniformly arrived too late to share either the dangers or the honors of the con

Fremont, the new man, it was hoped, could run the race successfully, and then Seward would be his Premier, and the real President of the United States, having it in his power so to play his eards, as to secure the succession. This then is the prospect, nay, the certainty before us if Fremont be elected. William H. Seward, in all but name, the next President of the United

Under the administration of a political imbecile like Fremout, it is obvious that we must look to the Cabinet, not the President, as the Government A partial list of that Cabinet has appeared in some of the Northern journals; for the abolitionist confident of victory, are already parcelling out the spoils. Seward, Secretary of State; Giddings, Secretary of the Treasury, and other abolitionists equally rank, for the other offices. The people are therefore about to decide in the election of President whether they shall be ruled over by Seward Giddings, Sumner, Burlingame & Co., or by na tional and conservative men.
