His object in making this recommendation is of course to leave the court in such a condition that it can, consistently with its own dignity and independence proceed with of habeas corpus and of withdrawing mardignity and independence, proceed with trials for treason and other crimes. The recent proceedings at New Orleans make the Chief Justice particularly unwilling to en-Chief Justice particularly unwilling to enter upon trials for treason where the action of his court might be interrupted by the military authorities. The orders issued in that case, as well as other recent orders, dead. clearly enough demonstrate that the peace proclamation doés not remove martial law; and the Chief Justice desires the assurance of a Presidential order or proclamation to the effect that the court will not be interfered with by the military in case proceedings in treason cases are begun.
