It is as positive as possible; for even the officers of the company cannot speak positively of work upon tunnels, which may be retarded by the occurrence of unexpected difficulties, or it may, on the other hand, be expedited by a change of the nature of rocks of the tunnel so as to make the labor of tunnelling easier than was anticipated. In these statements, however, allowance is made for delays. It will be seen that the company looks steadily forward to the completion of the read during the next year, so that the cars will be running regularly from Richmond to the Ohio, making due allowance for unexpected obstacles.

The rails were laid last week within three-quarters of a mile of Charleston, Kanawha, but there was a gap between the western end of the Ivid track and Huntington, on the Ohio, of some twenty miles. The low water in the Ohio has retarded the phipment of rails and delayed this work considerably. Yet we see the company's advertisement for opening of the line to the mouth of the Gauley by the 1st of November. This will certainly be done if the rails can be obtained. The water in the Ohio ought to be growing deeper under the influence of cool weather and occasional
