

MARKET RECOVERS STRENGTH FROM THE LATE STAGNATION

All Classes of Stock Respond to Better Feeling on the Exchange and Rise in Values Generally is Had.

MARKET RECOVERERS

NEW YORK March 9.—With today's market as a criterion Wall Street, at least the speculative fraternity, seemed to have recovered from the alarm occasioned by the recent political and diplomatic controversies. Trading was the largest and on broadest scale in recent weeks and almost wholly on a rising scale of values. Specialties scored the most substantial gains.

Metals were particularly prominent. American Zinc rose five points. Greene Cananea Copper also made a new maximum. Independent steel shares, as well as equipments, motors, oils and fertilizers and Mercantile Marine rose from two to six points. Sundry issues were appreciably better.

Texas Company led the petroleum which were affected by the Mexican disturbances. Rails were higher, with the exception of New Haven which was weak. Total sales were 710,000 shares.

Bonds were irregular, the total sales being \$2,400,000.

BOSTON, March 9.—Undoubtedly the business outlook remains encouraging. The principal feature in the situation, however, continues to be uncertainty. No other result is likely until the issue at Verdun is settled and until our relations with Germany are adjusted one way or the other. The action of the security market would seem to show that the big supply of securities has largely passed, from a weak, strong hands. At the same time there is not an aggressive movement to advance prices except in specialties. Prices lack the support of public buying although the easy money position prevents forced liquidation. It is still a waiting market and every day makes this more and more evident and would only buy stocks on the drives.

PHOENIX WOMAN IS SUICIDE WHILE HER UNCLE WAITS OUTSIDE

Mrs. Etta Kimmis fires bullet into Her Brain in Doctor's Office. Had Been Despondent for Some Time.

PHOENIX, March 9.—By sending a revolver bullet crashing through her brain, Mrs. Etta Kimmis ended a life of sorrow and pain at 1 o'clock yesterday afternoon. The suicide occurred in the downtown office of a physician where she was employed as an attendant.

Mrs. Kimmis had been despondent for many days and is believed to have been under the influence of drugs or liquor when she killed herself.

Her uncle, George Gann, was waiting to take her to his home when a shot rang out in an inner room. When Gann and the doctor reached her side she was dead. The blood was gushing from her head upon the carpet, a .32-calibre revolver, which she is believed to have purchased at some pawn shop, was by her side.

Mrs. Kimmis' life had been a stormy one. Her husband, a patent medicine salesman, is said to have deserted her and their two children a year ago in San Francisco. He had been in trouble with the authorities it is asserted and suddenly disappeared. Worry over his disappearance and neglect is believed to have been one of the things which brought about her determination to end it all.

Having been left without means of support, Mrs. Kimmis came to Phoenix with her daughter, Brucella, now 16 years old, and her little son, John, eight. They lived with her uncle, George Gann, and his family at No. 524 North Fourth Avenue. For several weeks before her suicide Mrs. Kimmis had not been herself. It is known that she had been drinking Jamaica ginger and it is suspected that she used drugs.

Last night she did not return to the Gann home and her relatives were much worried about her. She appeared at her place of employment about noon, evidently laboring under some excitement. Her uncle called a few minutes later but she declared, rather incoherently, that she did not intend to go home with him.

Plans were being made to take her by force, for it was apparent that she was in no condition to take care of herself, when she fired the shot that sent her to eternity.

Several years ago Mrs. Kimmis figured prominently in the San Francisco newspapers. She was riding on the front end of a cable car when a collision with an electric car occurred. Her legs were crushed between the two cars and physicians said that she would never walk again. For two years she lay in a hospital, her legs in casts. Skillful surgery performed a seeming miracle and when she left the hospital she was able to walk perfectly, though her legs were misshapen.

Shortly after the suicide of Mrs. Kimmis two notes were found in her desk. One was a scrawl, with only a few words decipherable and absolutely unintelligible. The other read as follows:

"Darling Brucella and John:
"Mama is just tired. Be a good boy and love Aunt Lizzie and Uncle Geo."

"Brucella—Frame your mind to Mirth and Merriment, which bars a thousand harms and lengthens life. Am perfectly sane, only tired."
"ETTA KIMMIS."

GUGGENHEIMS TAKE OVER SILVER BELL MINES NEAR TUCSON

Representative of Big Mining Syndicate Announces That Deal Has Been Closed. Important Developments.

TUCSON, March 9.—Announcement that the American Smelting and Refining company had purchased the holdings of the Imperial Copper company at Silverbell from Leo Goldsmith, trustee, who purchased the property at the bankrupt sale last spring, together with the Arizona Southern railroad running from Silverbell to Red Rock, was made yesterday evening by Julius Kruttschnitt, Jr., local representative of the smelting company.

He also confirmed the report that the American Smelting and Refining company had leased the smelter of the Southern Arizona Smelting company at Saco and would commence operations within a short time.

While there have been numerous reports of the purchase of the Imperial Copper company holdings at Silverbell following the start of exploration work in the property by experts of the smelting company, the announcement made yesterday evening by Mr. Kruttschnitt was the first authoritative news of the deal which was consummated yesterday.

While stating that the Imperial Copper company property and the railroad were held under bond by his company, Mr. Kruttschnitt declined to make pub-

lic the details of the deal as to the consideration. The lease of the smelter is said to have been made at a figure of approximately \$2000, but Mr. Kruttschnitt stated that he was not at liberty to make public the exact figure.

Begin Work at Once.
Mr. Kruttschnitt stated that work at the mine and smelter would start within the next 60 days, and that a force of men, at least 200 in number, would be put to work immediately on the mine and smelter. He stated that the first work would be completely rehabilitate the mine and plant and that then the work of getting ore out would start. He stated that the company expected to get out at least 400 tons per day.

Mr. Kruttschnitt will have the general supervision of the work of the mine and railroad, but the smelter leased from the Southern Arizona company, bankrupt, he said, would be operated by the smelting department of the company, and that a superintendent would be appointed within the near future.

Read's Directors Named.
Immediately upon the taking over of the Arizona Southern railroad yesterday, a meeting was held at which directors and officers were elected. The following directors were chosen: M. P. Freeman, G. W. Deltz, Julius Kruttschnitt, Jr., John B. Wright, and Charles E. Woodell. The officers chosen were as follows: M. P. Freeman, president; Julius Kruttschnitt, vice-president and general manager; G. W. Deltz, secretary-treasurer and traffic manager.

The railroad has a small mileage and runs from Silverbell to the main line of the Southern Pacific. With the rehabilitation of the properties at Silverbell, it will not only be important as a freight carrier but will do a considerable passenger business as well.

100 Claims Included.

The Imperial Copper company properties, which consist of nearly a hundred patented claims, have been in litigation for some time, following the bankruptcy of the company, of which Frank M. Murphy was president. Last spring the properties were sold at public auction by M. P. Freeman, receiver, to Leo Goldsmith of Tucson at sheriff's sale. The sale was made to satisfy a mortgage held by the Banker's Trust company. Following the sale, experts of the American Smelting and Refining company worked on the property and there have been persistent reports of the sale, but this was not announced officially until yesterday evening.

Smelter Cost \$500,000.

The smelter was blown in first in February, 1908, and blown out in August, 1910, on account of the lack of sufficient ore. It has a daily capacity of 750 tons. It cost more than \$500,000 and is located at Saco, eight miles south of Red Rock and 12 miles from Silverbell. The plant consists of a sampling mill, blast-furnace building, converter building, power house, boiler house, machine shop and smithy, all of steel frame, dwellings, store, office and miscellaneous buildings.

Not only will the ore from the mine be handled, but it is expected that the smelter will do custom work, thus affording great accommodation to the smaller mines nearby which have been obliged to ship to distant points.

The taking over of the mine and railroad and the leasing of the smelter means a big boost for the mining industry in Southern Arizona, mining men say.
