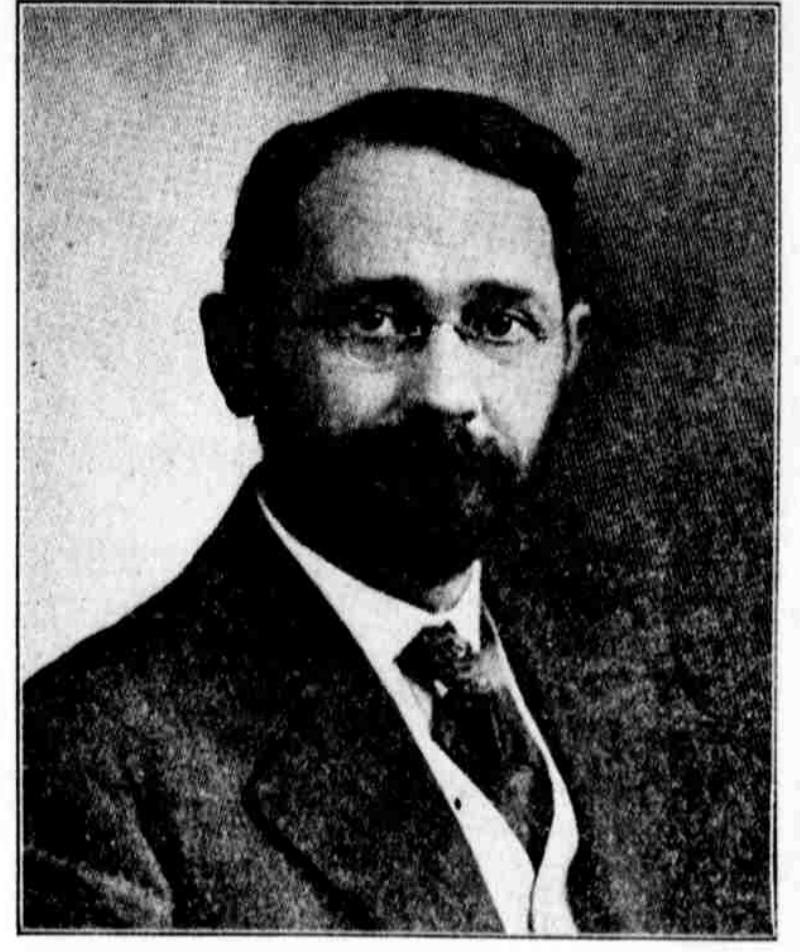

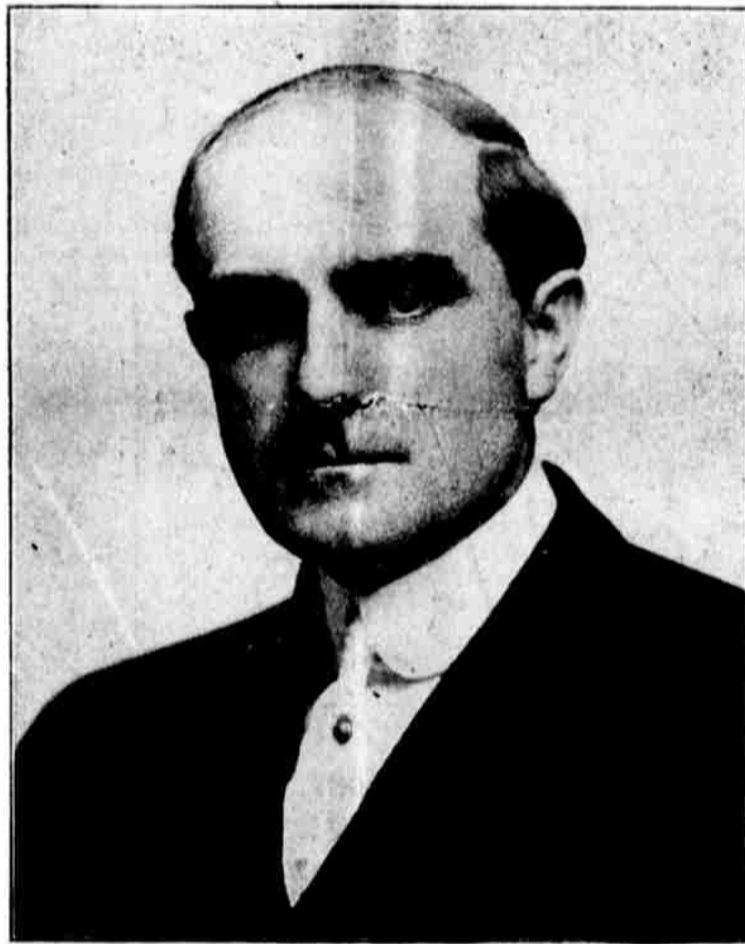
Judge Frank Johnston Jr. is making a good record on the Circuit bench.

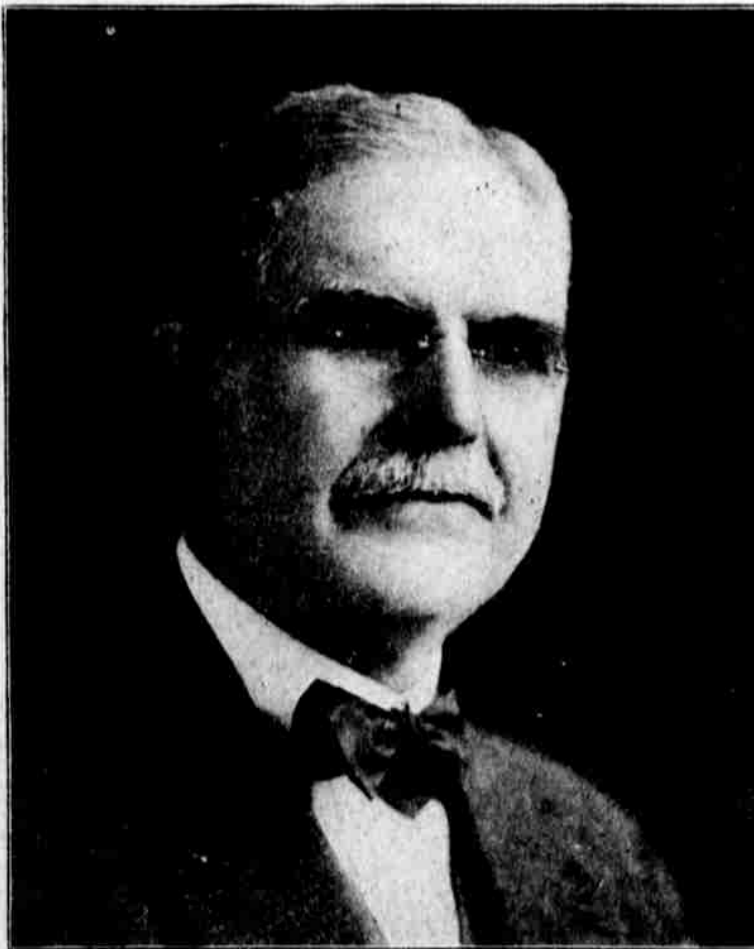

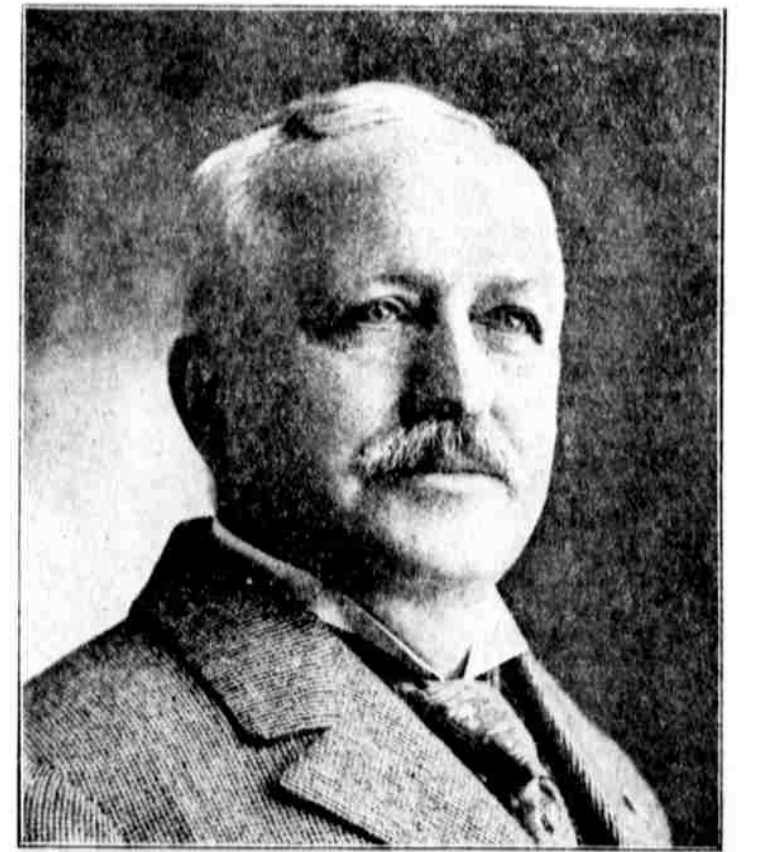
