TEN MEN AND A THOUSAND ONE OAK, \$4,000 W. L. DOUGLAS, BUILDER DEMPSEY AND DEFENSE DAY

Very good news for the United States is this: The President is considering the relative value of battleships and airplanes.

Those that sell battleships at forty million dollars apiece will tell the President that the country can't survive without plenty of battleships.

Manufacturers of hansom cabs would also have said a little while ago that the taxicab couldn't be a real success.

Before the President builds another battleship let him ask the builder this question: "Are you willing to build that ship for forty million dollars and guarantee that it will be about ten hours after being attacked by one hundred thousand dollars' worth of fighting airships?"

If the President discovers, as he will, that a hundred thousand dollars' worth of airships, manned by ten men, can destroy any forty-million dollar battleship with more than a thousand men on board, he will decide not to build battleships.

FREDERICKSBURG PREPARES FOR NEGRO ORGANIZATION SOCIETY ANNUAL MEETING.

Representative citizens of Fredericksburg met in the First Baptist Church at 8 P. M. September 12th and organized a local committee, which will have full charge of the reception and entertainment of the delegates to the 12th Annual Meeting of The Negro Organization Society, November 12-14 inclusive.

Rev. J. A. Bacotts, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Fredericksburg, principal of the Mayfield School, and a member of the Executive Committee of The Negro Organization Society, was appointed chairman by unanimous consent and Mrs. L. N. Robinson was elected secretary.

In accepting the chairmanship of the committee, Rev. Mr. Bacotts said, "Fredericksburg feels honored to have been chosen as the meeting place for such a worthy body as The Negro Organization Society, and every citizen is going to do his full share toward making it pleasant for those who will come as representatives of this splendid organization."

The chairman then proceeded to name various sub-committees, included among which were the following:

- 1. Committee on local speakers, to secure a welcome address each from some one representing the City Government, and some person representing the special interests of the colored people of Fredericksburg. 2. Committee on homes, to secure board and lodging for delegates at the most reasonable rate per day. 3. Committee on places of meeting, to secure suitable places of meeting for the various sessions of the Society. 4. Committee on local entertainment, to furnish such entertainment for delegates and speakers as may be deemed advisable by the general committee, and in keeping with the nature of the program. 5. Just before the close, the committee on homes held a brief meeting and decided to furnish board and lodging to delegates at the nominal rate of \$2.00 per day.
