A Pest House Proposition.

EDITORS HERALD: There is not a man, woman or child in the city of Los Angeles but what is interested in removing the smallpox hospital from its present position, surrounded as it is by residences, with all the brick yards just apove it in the cañon, so that men cannot go to or from their work and no brick can be hauled from the yards without passing within a few feet of the door of the pest house. It is simply a menace to the city, even when there is but one patient in it; but as we do not particularly need to move it just now there is but little thought or care about it. We have had within a few years three epidemics of this loathsome disease, and I recollect well what happened at these times I think in 1876 or '77 that the cit zens of Los Angeles had a public meeting and prepared resolutions de-claring that the city authorities had the power to take men, women or children from their homes and carry them away from the city, so that they could not communicate the disease to others, and that for the purpose of carrying out this object they had a right to use powder, dynamite or any other explosives to blow down houses, etc. Public sentiment is a hard thing to control when it is thoroughly aroused, but a few cool-headed men succeeded in quieting the population at that time. The next epidemic was in 1887-88, at this time the eople became so excited about removng the pest house that the city council for the want of any other place, con-cluded to move it further up the canon onto the Elysian park, thus proposing to ruin 450 acres of park worth \$100,000, for that purpose, and I think would have done so if they had not found that it was illegal, and that some of the San Francisco authorities had been arrested for putting a tent in one of the

city parks for smallpox patients.

Prepare for war in time of peace is a wise maxim, and now when there is no wise maxim, and now when there is no excitement on this subject I offer to sell to the city for smallpox hospitals the most suitable place that there is within ten miles of the city, as it is easy of access, completely isolated from roads or buildings, and would have the least objection interposed to its occupancy as a roset house of any place within five a pest house of any place within five miles of the city. In fact, I do not think there are ten men in the city that would not be in favor of securing it immediately at a fair price if they knew where it is and how it is situated. Will the city authorities consider this matter in its proper light, or will they say, like Felix of old: "Go thy way for this time;

at a more convenient season we will look into this matter?"






