ONE of the most extraordinary cases of robbery and murder that we ever heard of, occurred in broad daylight in New York the other day, and within a hundred yards of Broadway. An old gentleman of sixty was engaged in removing the snow from his pavement. Two men approached. One of them took off his overcoat, gave it to his companion to hold, seized the old gentleman, robbed him of his watch and wallet, and when grappled with ripped his victim's bowels open. The latter died shortly afterwards. The murderer escaped. Not a single individual on the street witnessed the occurrence.

OLIVIOUS.—Some twenty years ago there lived in a western city a merry set of Scotch men, whose mirth was not always regulated on the cold water principle. John B. was a prominent member. One particularly jolly night the "malt had abounded the malt," and towards the sma' hours two of his friends found him sitting upon a drygoods box, not far from his bachelor quarters. As they were passing, he asked, "do you ken whaur Johnny B. lives?" "You are Johnny B.—yourself," was the reply. "I ken that, man, said Johnny; but whaur does Johnny B. live?" That was the point.

SILVER MINES.—The penitentiary artesian well at Joliet has revealed a new wealth to Illinois imagination. After boring through a "splendid quality" of building stone at a depth of fifteen feet and a thick bed of white marble at forty feet, the workmen "struck a vein of silver." The drill dust, on being subjected to a chemical analysis, developed unquestionable silver mineral. The extent or richness of the vein cannot definitely be known without digging a larger hole. The presence of silver in the geological formation of Illinois has never before been dreamed of by scientific men.

Baldwin, the assassin of Mr. William Parker, Superintendent of the Panama Railroad, died at Aspinwall on the morning of the 10th ult., after lingering for nearly three months from the effects of the wound in his hands. On several occasions he attempted to take his own life, but the vigilance of his keepers prevented him from so doing. He never expressed regret for his bloody deed.

TWENTY years ago, the bell of the North Presbyterian Church at Iowa City, was spirited away by an episcopal clergyman named Hummer, and carried to Salt Lake City. Rev. Mr. Osmond, the present pastor of the church, has received a letter from Brigham Young, expressing willingness to give up the bell and aid its return to the church.

A dispatch from Jefferson, Texas, reports the arrest by the military of Colonel R. P. Camp, and L. Marshall and B. T. Thompson, and two freedmen. The charges are not known. Several others are said to be spotted for arrest.

All the cigar makers of the country, it is said, are sending specimens of their wares to Gen. Grant.

In New York, the detectives now mistake newspaper reporters for pickpockets, and order them out of the street cars.
