The Survivors of Perry's Victory. A distinguished officer of the war of 1812, an aid to Gen. Harrison, now in our city, sends us the following which we publish with pleasure:

The last Sunday's papers published the following item of news: "Deliver Parsons, an eminent and venerable physician of Providence, R. I., died Saturday, aged 80. He was surgeon of the flagship Lawrence, in the battle of Lake Erie, and the last surviving commissioned officer of Perry's fleet."

Dr. Usher Parsons, of Providence, was the surgeon of Perry's fleet, and is reported to have died on the 10th of September last (the day on which he had intended to be present at the celebration at Put-in-Bay. The item just quoted is in error in saying he was the last surviving commissioned officer of that fleet. Commodore Chaplin resides in Buffalo, N. Y., and died the last day, in command of the Scorpion.

Dr. W. T. Taliferro, an eminent citizen of Cincinnati, and another veteran now living in Boone county, Ky., were volunteer marines in the battle, and Taliferro, afterward followed up the blow by crossing the Lake and taking part in Johnson's regiment in the battle of the Thames—a double honor won by no other patriot.

Noah Webster's son, William C. Webster, who helped to make the famous dictionary, is dead, aged fifty-three years.

Miss Ellwood, the professional skater, is announced at the Buffalo rink to give an exhibition, "dressed to represent Mercury."

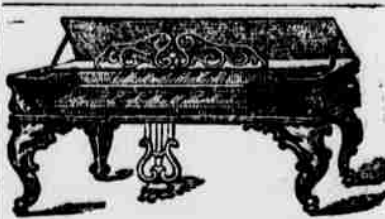
