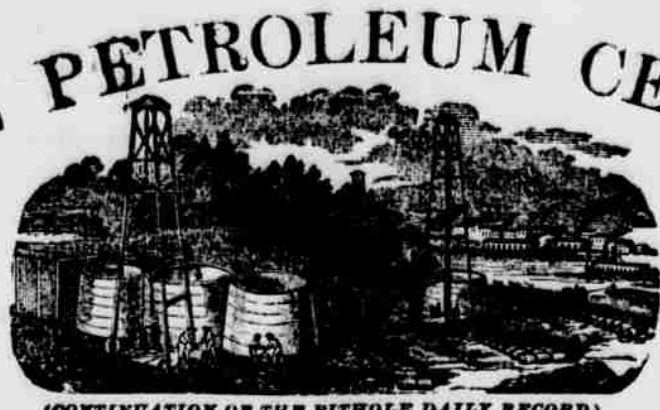

The Land for Consumptives.

A letter from Lima, Peru, gives the following description of the Valley of Juacca: "A gentleman, a native of Chile, just from the valley of Juacca, where he went to be cured by the bracing atmosphere of the mountains of that district, of disease of the lungs, informed me that his case had been pronounced incurable, that his right lung was entirely gone, and that the left was far advanced in the disease, and, as a last resort, he was advised to take a trip to Juacca, where he arrived in February last. He has since left for his native country, physically a sound man. He states that there were at least twenty fellow sufferers at the valley from Bolivia, Buenos Ayres and Chile, and that every one of them was progressing rapidly. I trust to be able to send by an early steamer a few observations and facts in connection with the Valley of Juacca, so that your readers may know that there is more truth than fiction in the well known healing properties of the climate of that celebrated valley, especially for persons afflicted with consumption, and that hundreds have from time to time, been radically restored to good health without the aid of drug or doctor, many of them advanced in the last stage of this terrible disease.

The first locomotive used in New England is now in the shop of the Portland and Kennebec Railroad, in Augusta, Maine, under repair for the dummy train to Gardiner.
