The Mines Cave Again Near the Dividing Line of the Nineteenth and Twentieth Wards—Breaking the Record at the Lower Mill—They Will Become Lawyers—Other News in Shorter Paragraphs.

THAT CARBONDALE INJUNCTION.

Testimony Taken Before Attorneys Jones and Burr Saturday Afternoon. In order to facilitate the work of Judge Archibald on the Carbonada Traction company's injunction case that will be argued tomorrow afternoon, Attorney John R. Jones, representing the borough of Archibald and Attorney J. E. Burr, for the Carbonada Traction company, took testimony Saturday in Attorney Jones' office in the Coal Exchange on Wyoming avenue.

The evidence developed many contradictions. The first witness called was W. F. Sailer, manager of the Carbonada Traction company. He admitted that the road was not completed within the time specified in the ordinance, but when asked why it was not, stated that cars had been run to Archibald for nearly a year but nothing had been done toward extending the tracks to the southern boundary line till April 23 last. He finally attributed the blame to the street committee of the borough consisting of E. A. Jones, Edward Blake and Edward Lane.

Mr. Thompson, too, blamed the street committee of the borough for a portion of the delay by saying that the members failed to keep an appointment made in March to determine where the location of the tracks should be. Five members of the borough council were present and gave their testimony as to when work was begun and the present unfinished condition of the road. They denied emphatically that they had ever hindered the work in any way; that they never made an appointment that they did not keep, and were at all times ready to do the agreement of the company and stood ready at all times to further construction in any way. They testified that the rails and ties were deposited without regard to order, that some rails were not spiked, others had no joints, while there were no poles or overhead work to be seen.
