WHEAT RECOVERS LOST GROUND

The Bull Pool Made Its Strength Apparent in September.

December Advances 3 Cents Partly on Account of the Upward Rush of September -- Provisions Unusually Strong .- Liverpool Shows a Decline at the Beginning.

Chicago, Aug. 25 .- Nearly all of yesterday's decline in the grain pits was recovered today. The bull pool made its strength apparent in September wheat and advanced that option five cents per bushel, while December advanced three cents, partly on account of the upward rush of September, but principally on account of the bullish-ness of the day's news. Corn was even more active than wheat and closed at a 1%a%c. advance. Oats advanced %c. Provisions were unusually strong and showed advances ranking from 121/2 to 20 cents at the close

How strong a hold the bull clique had on September wheat was shown soon after the opening today. The opening was decidedly strong, though this was due more to the bullish nature of the early news than to "squeezing." September was quoted at the opening at from 931/2 to 93%, compared with yesterday's closing price of 91% and touched 94 almost immediately after. It dropped back to 921/2 and then it was that the spurs were put in. Offerings of September ceased almost altogether, the bull crowd apparently sure of their position, "standing pat" and the price jumped and kept jumping until about 11 o'clock it had reached 97 cents. Traders in December had not been idle in the meantime. That option started at 91a91½, an advance of %a¼ from yesterday, touched 92 cents, went back 901/2, then went on the run to 94, There was a slight interval of weakness about an hour from the opening. when the New York market yielded, but the slight decline occasioned was quickly recovered.

Wall Street Review New York, Aug. 25.—The weekly crop report of the agricultural department at

Washington was the depressing influence in the stock market today, as it was a stimulating influence upon the prices of wheat and corn. The opinion expressed in the government report of unfavorable condition of the corn crop and of impaired yield from the spring wheat crop was of too serious import to the grain carrying railroads not to have a marked effect on the values. There were various times during the day when a struggle was made against the prevalent depression and when prices seemed embarked upon an upward course, but the fact would recur that a large part of the long advance in the price of the grain carrying roads has been predicted upon the abundance. Tonics, Bleaches, Rouges roads has been predicted upon the abund-ant grain crop which it was expected was to be moved and prices would turn down-wards again. The cases where prices were above yesterday's closing, at any time during the day are exceptional, and those where they remained above at the close are still fewer. The fact that set-tlement day on the London exchange developed no short interest or covering de-mand was to some extent disappointing to the bulls. The heaviness in all departments of the London exchange growing out of the evidence of serious disaffection on the northwest frontier of the Indian empire exercised some sympathetic influ-ence in the local market. Commission house buying was on a much reduced scale and there were a lull of the activity on the part of the large moneyed interests which have been prominent in mar-ket recently. The sales fell to a total of little more than one-third of that shown by the dealing on some days of re-cent period of activity. The extreme duliness at the decline indicated a healthy tone of the market, the liquidation at no time being heavy and the resistance at corn has been even more active the leadership of some individual stock which was influenced by a development especially affecting it. The total sales were 292,250 shares.


