

Limit of Prohibition Is From April 1 to May 23-Violators Will Be Fined.

This is the time that the police on the river front are looking for those enthu-siastic anglers who violate the police regulations by catching the wrong kinds

The particular regulation which is now being strictly enforced reads as

That no person shall catch or kill in the waters of the Potomac River or its tributaries within the District of Columbia any black bass (otherwise known as green bass and chub), crapple (otherwise known as calico bass and strawberry bass), between April 1 and May 29 of each year; nor have in pos-session nor expose for sale any of said species of fish at any other time during the year except by angling."

To Save Species. In this way the authorities hope to

keep the black bass and crappie from becoming extinct in the waters around Washington. The need of a regulation on the matter is easily recognized at this time, because in April and May all fishermen hie themselves to the river intent on eatehing fish without much regard for the kinds they get.

The authorities, however, have con-tended for some years that the sportsmen ought to be willing to make some sacrifices in order to keep the Potomac stocked with as many species of fish as possible. If the fisherm m will not do this of their own accord, the police will see that the regulation is enforced by the power of the Police Court.
