In recent trading concessions in prices were made all around the room and the general market ranges ½ to 1½ points below the highest of the early trading. Government bonds unchanged.

A vigorous slap at prices was made at the opening in a few stocks, but was only partly successful. Reading opened down 1½, rallying ½ at once. Amalgamated was heavy. Anaconda opened 3 per cent higher.

Anaconda closed strong, up 13½ points. The rest of the list was indifferent and fully two-thirds of the usually active list made some little net decline for the day.
