Cowed by Gaping Guns, Trainload of Convicts Pass Through the City

Crowd of Noted Prisoners From Many States En Route in Irons to Cells in New Federal Penitentiary at Atlanta.

The train, said to be the greatest con-vict train ever known in the history of this country, was composed of three coaches, each containing thirty or more and had that consolation when they awoke this morning, a little later and a tribe stiffer in the joints than usual. handcuffed and shackled men usual to spend many years in the Atlanta penal institution. The train left the last named city about 12:20 o'clock this afternoon and made a quick run to Washington.

All the prisoners have been confined in State prisons up to this time, but the law says they must be put in a Federal institution. The Atlanta prison was built to accommodate Federal charges from all over the United States, and the ninety-six who visited Washington and saw its sights from the windows of speeding cars will be among the first occupants of the newly-made and heav-

ily-barred cells.


