

Y. M. C. A. BOYS LEAVE FOR CAMP

Will Spend Fortnight Camp-
ing on Silver Bay,
N. Y.

One of the merriest parties that has left Washington for a summer outing was that composed of fourteen Y. M. C. A. boys, who left this morning at 10 o'clock for Silver Bay, N. Y.

For two weeks they expect to be out in the woods on Silver Bay Island, where they will enjoy the pleasures of outdoor life. They have been fitted out with everything for camp life. Tents, camp stools, blankets, canteens, and everything needed by sportsmen have been provided.

The boys will be met in New York by A. M. Chesley, secretary of the Boys' Y. M. C. A., who has gone on ahead to make arrangements for them. They will immediately begin their trip up the Hudson, which will be one of the features of their outing.

The party left this morning under the personal supervision of Secretary Williams, of the Y. M. C. A., who will remain with the boys the entire two weeks.

JULY BUILDING MAKES CREDITABLE SHOWING

Building statistics for July make a very creditable showing. During the month permits were taken out in forty-five of the leading cities, according to official reports to Construction News for 13,899 buildings involving a total cost of \$45,650,330, against 12,692 buildings aggregating in cost \$47,157,415 for the corresponding month a year ago, a gain of 92 buildings and a loss of \$1,507,085, or 3 per cent, in cost. Of the cities enumerated there were gains in twenty-seven and losses in only seventeen. This is in the face of a long continued period of unusual activity, high prices for building material and tight money, the latter more notably in the East and South. The West seems to have ample funds with which to continue construction without interference. For illustration, building in Chicago was in excess of any corresponding month in fifteen years.

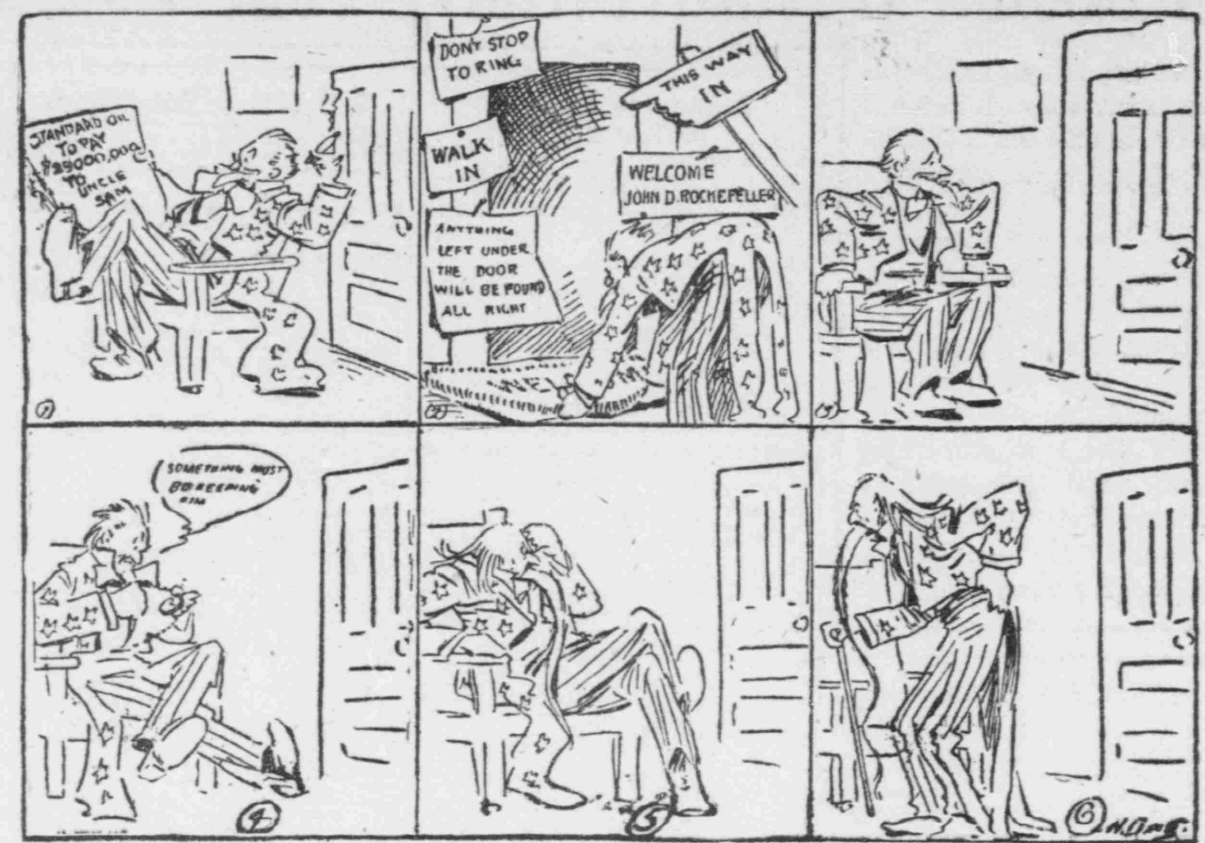
A careful review of the figures indicates a thoroughly healthy condition as a rule, the losses being with the exception of New York and Brooklyn and in the South, scattering and at points widely remote from each other.

The gains are numerous and in many instances more than satisfactory. In one way they far more than make up for the loss of 3 per cent.

A feature of the building situation noticeable at this time is the large amount of small construction. This condition prevails pretty generally all over the country and is indicative of a healthy situation. Building news continues to come in upon a generous scale and from sources often least expected, but for the present it is confined chiefly to small buildings.

STRANGER DIES SUDDENLY; OUT LATE NIGHT BEFORE

Gus Bath, a tailor, died suddenly yesterday morning at his boarding house, 20, Thirteenth street, northwest. He came to this city recently, and little or nothing is known of him. Bath was out late Saturday night. Early yesterday morning Mrs. Schrott, with whom he boarded, heard groans in his room and summoned the Emergency Hospital ambulance. When it arrived Bath was dead.

Coroner Nevitt gave a certificate of death by natural causes. It is thought Bath has relatives in Baltimore.

EXPERTS TO EXAMINE COAL FROM THE SOUTH

Under the direction of experts of the United States Geological Survey, which recently moved its fuel testing plant from St. Louis, Mo., to Norfolk, Va., commencing on Thursday next, experiments will be made on Eastern and Southern coals to determine their heat units, carbon, and steam producing values that may be of inestimable commercial value to mine owners and consumers alike.

This work was commenced two years ago in St. Louis, and the results of the investigations have demonstrated it is possible to have 10 per cent of the coal bill of the nation from Western coals, or \$100,000,000.

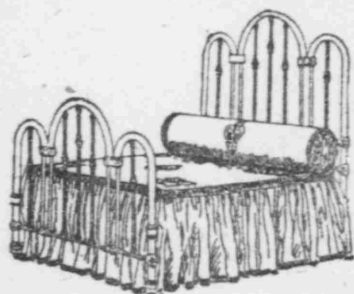
WAR VETERAN IS DEAD, FUNERAL THIS AFTERNOON

MILLER SCORES PRESIDENT FOR DISMISSING TROOPS

President Roosevelt is the subject of severe criticism at the hands of Prof. Kelly Miller, of Howard University, in a public letter, entitled "Roosevelt and the Negro." The letter deals with the Brownsville affair, and the treatment of the negro as a citizen generally. Professor Miller, while crediting the President with original fairness toward the black man, and giving unstinted

praise for official acts that have been beneficial to the race, is unsparring in his criticism of the Chief Executive, and says that he "is placed as chief among those who breathe out hatred and slaughter against the negro with every vital breath." The dismissal of the negro soldiers was, says Professor Miller, "upon insufficient evidence, cruel, arbitrary, and unconstitutional."

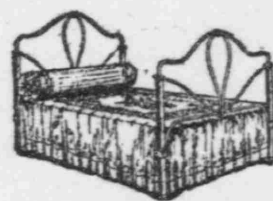
