EXPERTS TO EXAMINE COAL FROM THE SOUTH

Under the direction of experts of the inited States Geological Survey, which recently moved its fuel testing plant from St. Louis, Mo., to Norfolk, Va., commencing on Thursday next, experi-ments will be made on Eastern and Southern coals to determine their heat units, carbon, and steam producing values that may be of inestimable commercial value to mine owners and consumers alike.

This work was commenced two years ago in St. Louis, and the results of the investigations have demonstrated it is possible to have 10 per cent of the coal bill of the nation from Western coals, or \$160,000,000.


