

## PARIS IS DOUBTFUL OF WIDOW'S GUILT

Poise of Mme. Steinheil and  
Testimony Changes  
Sentiment.

PARIS, Nov. 7.—Paris—that maelstrom of emotional, impulsive, and volatile humanity—hangs in the balance of doubt today as it reflects upon the case of Madame Steinheil, the "Red Widow," after reviewing the testimony in the case during the past twenty-four hours.

A day ago all Paris, with its impassioned verdict prepared in advance against the wonderful woman now fighting against the charge of murdering her husband and mother, was satisfied that her road justly led to the guillotine. Today the populace stands in a state of suspense and uncertainty.

Sentiment Changes.

The question today is not "When will Madame Steinheil go to the guillotine," but rather:

"Shall it be the sacrifice of a woman's blood, who may, after all, be innocent, or shall she be acquitted?"

All this remarkable change in the kaleidoscope of public sentiment is due to the fact that strong testimony has been given in favor of Madame Steinheil. At least two witnesses who were supposed to have been prepared to offer evidence in behalf of the prosecution, furnished testimony tending to prove the innocence of what Paris is now terming its "Second Pompadour."

In fact, this wonderful woman has so swung the pendulum in her own behalf by her own cross-examination and dramatic interjections during the submission of testimony by a witness, that the crowded court hooted him; offering him short shrift in the way of sympathy as he wended his way through the almost unmanageable mob upon leaving the stand.

Accused Is Worn Out.

Madame Steinheil is virtually in a state of physical collapse this morning after the trying ordeal of an exciting day in court yesterday. Yet her spirits are unquenched; she listens with a vivacity and excited interest to her counsel, Maître Aubin. Her indomitable will, her irrepressible persistence and that remarkable faculty for non-chalance which manifests itself at dramatic times during the most important sessions of the great inquisitorial trial, is slowly but surely winning Paris over to her side. For Paris loves an accomplished actress, and that Madame Steinheil is one there can be no gaining.

Bonnaud, the French painter, brother-in-law of the murdered man, a straggly type of humanity, tall, lean and cadaverous, with strikingly appearing red hair, was the witness who was hooted and hissed in court yesterday.

Says Sister Opposed Her.

He took the stand bustling with hostility and said that when he married Madame Steinheil's sister the family received him cordially, but when they heard of Madame Steinheil's conduct he and his wife ignored her and had not spoken to her, in fact, for ten years.

"Her husband adored her," testified Bonnaud. "But he was very sad. Once when he was seriously ill she didn't even attend him." Madame Steinheil was upon her feet in an instant, her face blazing with indignant emotion.

"This is an untruth," she cried. "It is not so. Dr. Achery, the family physician, will tell you I attended him hand and foot, gave him medicine and watched him night and day." But Bonnaud only sneered with cool disdain.

"Ah," retorted Madame Steinheil, "you may shrug your shoulders, but I'll attend to you yet." Then she took her place again, whispering confidences and directions to her attorney. Bonnaud went on to say that he arrived early on the morning of the crime and examined the two bodies. He said the body of Steinheil seemed to have been carried to the point where it was found.

"Did you see Madame Steinheil?" asked the judge.

"No," was the somewhat astonishing reply. "I didn't want a sensational scene."

## DOZENS VISIT HOME OF MRS. A. STETSON

New York Christian Scientist  
Leader Does Not Attend Church.

NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—In her beautiful colonial home at 7 West Ninety-sixth street, which is so close to the First Church of Christian Scientists that it might be mistaken for a parish house, Mrs. Augusta Stetson, accused by Virgil O. Strickler, first reader, of having taught mental assassination to her students, in efforts to injure her enemies in control of the mother church, received dozens of visitors today.

"They called to express their sympathy and to hope that Strickler be ousted as a result of the investigation made by the trustees."

The atmosphere of the Christian Science Church clings about the Stetson home. The color scheme of the interior part of the house is light, white and blue predominating. There are few pictures on the walls, but these show evidence of fine taste. One photograph which attracts attention as soon as the house is entered is that of Mrs. Mary Baker Eddy. On tables are large clusters of white flowers.

Mrs. Stetson remained in her room

this morning and received only a few of the many officials who called. The others were received by her sisters, one of whom said to the Munsey News Service reporter, "Mrs. Stetson may have something to say later. She will not receive newspaper men this morning. She will not attend any church today."

The Ninety-sixth street church was crowded by 11 o'clock. The making public of the testimony taken at Boston in the secret session of the board of directors of the Christian Science Mother Church last summer, and which led to the withdrawal of Mrs. Stetson's license and her admission twice, had been read by all, and there was a feeling of expectation in the air. The Strickler followers were satisfied with the bomb that had been thrown into the Stetson camp.

YOUTH IS KILLED  
WHILE HUNTING

Companion Is Badly Injured When  
Both Boys Stumble and  
Guns Explode.

TOLEDO, Ohio, Nov. 7.—Lake Nesbitt, fourteen years, is dead, and Laverne Lagrange, seventeen years of age, both of Port Huron, lies in the hospital with a wound in the left thigh as the result of an accidental shooting affair which took place on the Pere Marquette tracks half a mile south of the Stone road bridge early today.

"The boys left their homes this morning to go on a hunting expedition. They walked north on the Pere Marquette and the supposition is that both fell to the ground after stumbling at the same time."

Both guns were discharged and Nesbitt was instantly killed, while Lagrange was quite badly injured. He will recover.
