

LARGE CONTRIBUTION TO G. W. MEMORIAL

Clarence P. King Announces
Success in Raising Fund for
Alexandria Temple.

ALEXANDRIA, Nov. 5.—Two large contributions have been made to the fund for the erection of the memorial temple to George Washington. The Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of Virginia made a contribution of \$500. A similar contribution was made by the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of Virginia.

The raising of funds for the temple is in the hands of a ways and means committee, of which Clarence P. King, of Washington, is chairman. This committee is bending all its efforts to raising \$100,000.
