U. S. ASKS BIDS FOR 25 WOODEN SHIPS

The United States Shipping Board has announced that sealed bids for the purchase of twenty-five wooden ships will be opened in the office of the Secretary here at 10 o'clock Monday morning, May 5. A certified check payable to the United States of America for 20 per cent of the amount of the bid must accompany each bid. The balance of the successful bid is to be paid on delivery of bill of sale. Bids must be made so as to stand for at least ten days after the opening date. Successful bidders may transfer vessels to foreign registry, if desired. The United States Shipping Board reserves the right to reject any and all bids. Each of the twenty-five vessels placed on sale by the board averages 3,500 tons deadweight. Their fuel consumption is about twenty-four tons per day, when averaging nine knots per hour at sea. These vessels are suitable for coastwise trans-Atlantic or Trans-Pacific trading. A number of vessels of similar type have performed splendidly in the Pacific-Coast-Hawaiian trade. They have been operated between the United States and Central American, West Indian and South American ports on both coasts. Their suitability to carry dry and perishable cargoes has been demonstrated. All of the vessels were built under the direction of the Emergency Fleet Corporation. They are modern in all respects and suitable for ocean trading anywhere in the world.
