Have \$1,000,000 For Backing Jack

TOLEDO, Ohio, June 28 .- Approximately \$1,000,000 has been rushed into town from all parts of the country with this instruction: "Bet it at even money that Jack Dempsey whips Jess Willard on July 4." The bulk of the fortune came from plungers in the big cities who hoped to find odds against Dempsey in their own towns. But practically all of that \$1,000,000 remains unplaced. There is no financial backing for Willard, and right now there is the belief that before fight time Dempsey will rule a 5 to 4 and perhaps a 5 to 3 favorite over the champion.


