

# GERMANY NOT TO PARTICIPATE IN ARMS MEET

State Department Announces Invitation Was Never Offered.

Reports that Germany might be invited to participate in the forthcoming armaments conference were denied today by the State Department. It was announced that there has never been any intention of inviting Germany, as that nation is not looked upon now as one of the leaders in military power.

The Administration is highly

pleased with the evidences of co-operation which have been received from those delegates who have already arrived in this country, it was said. Statements which delegates have made here and abroad indicate a spirit of co-operation which leads Administration officials to be optimistic of success, it was stated.

There will be no attempt to keep Belgium, the Netherlands, Portugal and China out of any of the sessions which discuss Far Eastern questions, it was announced, but those nations will participate fully.

No official status will be given to unofficial observers sent here by non-participating nations during the conference, it was announced.

**PORTUGUESE BANKERS TO AID EXCHANGE SITUATION**

LISBON, Oct. 28.—As the result of threatening letters, leading Portuguese bankers met today at the Bank of Portugal and decided to assist the exchange situation.

The letters had threatened to blow up banks unless the exchange rates were brought nearer normal to assist commerce and industry.

# NEGRO CONGRESS PRAISES HARDING FOR RACE VIEWS

Commends Birmingham Speech In Resolution to Be Given Chief Executive.

The executive committee of the National Race Congress yesterday held an eight-hour session in the Mt. Carmel Baptist Church, Third and I streets, when President Harding's speech at Birmingham was discussed and the following resolution adopted, after a lengthy and spirited debate:

"Be it resolved, That the executive committee of the National Race Congress of the United States of America do heartily commend the courage and wisdom shown by the President in going to the heart of the South, rather than to the North or West, to present the solution of the so-called race problem, and that we endorse his contention that white and colored citizens alike be given equal political, economic, and educational opportunities."

The following were appointed to convey the above-mentioned resolutions to President Harding: The Revs. J. Milton Waldron, M. A. Tally, J. L. S. Holloman, W. H. Jernagin, J. Harvey Randolph, and H. H. Price.

The executive committee of this congress is made up of representatives from each State and Territory in the Union, where the colored people live in large numbers and is an influential body, representing all phases of political, industrial, and educational opinion in the race. It has headquarters in Washington, and at its session today elected the Rev. Dr. M. A. Tally, of Selma, Ala., as executive secretary, who will give his whole time to the work.

# POLICE SEEKING FAMILY OF MAN DEAD IN MORGUE

Identity Also Sought of Man Found on Street With Fractured Skull.

Police of the city are looking for the relatives of one unidentified man who is dead in Freedman's Hospital morgue and another who is lying unconscious in Emergency Hospital.

The dead man was about sixty-five years old and had a gray mustache. He wore a brown suit and hat, black shoes and socks and a white shirt. On his watch chain for a charm was the image of a monkey.

The man who is unconscious at Emergency Hospital is suffering from a fracture of the skull. He was found at Four-and-a-half and L streets southwest last night by George H. Sudarth, 643 Fourth street northeast. At the hospital it was said this morning he responded to treatment but that his condition is still critical. Detective Sergeants Stringfellow and Lynn are investigating the case.

According to the police report, the man fell from the rear end of a street car on K street, between Four-and-a-half and L streets southwest. He is about forty-five years old.

John Downe, seventy-three years old, of Bowie, Md., who was stopping at 627 L street southeast, was found unconscious this morning, apparently suffering from the effects of illuminating gas. It was said at the Emergency Hospital his condition is not critical. The gas jets in his room were turned on when he was discovered.

# M'ADOO FORCES PLAN NOT FIGHT TO OUST WHITE

Former Secretary Has Eyes on 1924 Nomination—Pins Hopes on Roper.

That the meeting of the Democratic National Committee in St. Louis Tuesday may develop into a lively family row was freely admitted today by Democratic leaders.

George White, chairman of the committee, probably will be the storm center. One faction is anxious to keep White in power, while another wants to get him out of power.

Outside Talent Sought.

A canvass of the committee has been made to determine whether it will be possible to obtain the consent of two-thirds of the members to the election of a chairman from outside of the committee. If this is found possible there is little doubt but what White will go.

A group, known as the McAdoo group, is understood to be seeking the election of Daniel G. Roper as chairman to succeed White.

An influential Democrat who has stood high in the councils of his party for many years, but who asked that his name be not used, sized up the situation as follows:

"The Democratic party must be reorganized upon a liberal and progressive basis. It would regain the confidence of the people. With elections coming on, we must have a man at the head of the national committee with the ability of not only organizing districts for votes and obtaining the necessary funds to carry on campaigns, but one who can develop real issues upon which the party and its candidates must stand. We should be with the Republicans when they are right, but we should give them the most formidable contention when they are wrong."

Fear Coup by McAdoo.

"George White is a most estimable man, but he has clearly shown that he has no aptitude for the job and is evidently being held there by the reactionary machine that has obtained control of the party. All agree that Daniel G. Roper is the man best fitted in the Democratic ranks to reorganize the party, but the controlling element, which is strongly anti-Wilson and anti-McAdoo, see in his candidacy an attempt by McAdoo to control the committee in favor of his Presidential aspirations in 1924, therefore they are against him, although they know that he could bring order and perhaps success out of the seemingly hopeless muddle that is the present situation."

Just how and who will lead the fight against White in St. Louis has not been revealed by his opponents. They admit that the former attacks against the chairman were premature and were hurtful to the cause of a liberal democracy, but they feel now that the situation has developed to such a critical stage that something must be done at the coming meeting if the Democratic party hopes for any success in the coming Congressional elections.

Mrs. Maria F. Howe left an estate valued at \$13,460 to relatives, as did William A. King, whose estate is valued at \$3,400. An estate valued at \$8,000 was left by Joseph H. Esser, who died August 5.

A petition for letters of administration of the estate of Albert S. Johnson was filed by sisters of the deceased. The estate is valued at \$111,000.

# CATHOLIC UNIVERSITY TO OBSERVE DISARM PARLEY

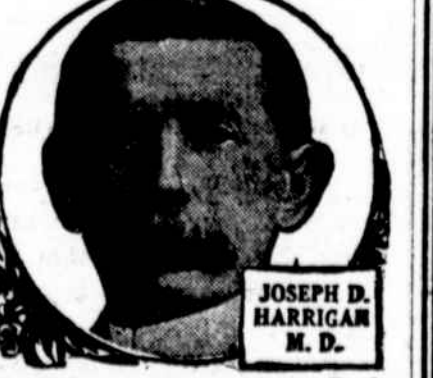
