Postmaster-General Key on Cheap Postage.

Postmaster-General Key in a letter to Postmaster James, of New York, says:

"A printed promissory note or an insurance policy filled out ready for signature may be mailed as third-class matter, but when they have been finally executed or countersigned by the signature of the person who finally approves them, so that they become the representative of a monetary value, they are subject to letter rates of postage, as being in the nature of purely personal correspondence between the two parties interested. The same rule will apply to printed commercial papers, such as drafts, checks, etc., and as to deeds, bonds, etc., whether drawn by public functionaries or private parties. A partly printed bill filled out in writing may be sent as third-class matter."

In regard to cheap postage Mr. Key says:

"The department does not share the apprehensions expressed by you of a decrease in the revenues consequent upon the adoption by Congress in response to an almost universal demand from the press and the people of a more liberal postal policy.
