HURT BY CLEVELAND.

Pennsylvania Wool-Growers Already Suffer ing an Account of His Free Wool Talk. Washington, Pa., Dec. 12.—The wool-rowers of Southwestern Pennsylvania re already feeling the effects of President eveland's declaration in favor of free not. Several large jobbers have called in their buyers, teeling confident that whether the President's recommendation is adopted or not the price of wool will be lower. The indications are that farmers will be unable to dispose of their stock for some time, except at a sacrifice. There will be more reports to the same

effect. Buyers are not going to load up with American wool with the recommer dation of the President staring them in the face, the Precident backed by a rabid free trade party having a majority in the House and being close upon the heels of the majority in the Senate. But we need not ask wool-buyers what

they think. Wool-growers have promptly told what they think, and they think there can be but one result of the President's recommendation. This result is shown in the withdrawal of the woolbayers.

Sabbath Observance in Two Continents. Those Americans who insist that the American Sunday shall not be modeled after the Continental Sunday are in the habit of pointing to the loose observance of the day in the old world and drawing from that a strong argument against th further drift in that direction.

It would appear, from recent inquiries on the subject, that the old world itself is not entirely satisfied with the down ward tendency of its social condition as s result of the practical non-observance of the day of rest. This from the New York Evening Post is very instructive on this

point: The friends of Sabbath observance have always maintained that if Sunday were not maintained as a sacred day, its retention as a day of rest from toil would prove very difficult. In this they are apparently right. In all the Continental countries, along with readiness to be amused on Sunday comes also readiness to work. It seems difficult, if not impossible, to force a rule which allows people to play lawn tennis, or go to the theatre, or att in beer gardens, but forbids them to work in factories or keep their shops open. The experience of Germany, which has recently been collected, though in a somewhat imperfect way, by a Prussian Government invesligation, seems to contain a great deal of instruction on this point. From returns obtained from thirty out of thirty-five provinces or departments, containing 500 156 manufacturing establishments and 1,582,591 workmen, it was found that 57.75 per cent of the factories kept at work on Sunday. 


