CITY FINANCIERS

Consider Refunding of the City's
Bonded Indebtedness.

ONE LOAN TO COVER ALL DEBTS

Meets with Favor at the Meeting of the Special Council Committee, and an Ordinance to that Effect will be Drawn Up—The Plan is in a Rough State as a Starter, and is to be Gone into More Detail Later.

The special committee of council on refunding the city's indebtedness met last night. There were present: Chairman Horkheimer, Berry, Higgins, Hazlett, of the committee, Clerk Watkins and City Solicitor Nesbitt. The meeting came to order at 8 o'clock, and until adjournment at 10 o'clock, the discussion took a very wide range.

Acting upon the supposition at first that the committee was appointed only to look into the feasibility of refunding the city's debt, no attempt was made to outline a plan for the refunding. Afterward it was decided to outline a plan at a future meeting, to be called by the chairman, just so soon as Solicitor Nesbitt drafts an ordinance conforming to the resolution, introduced by Mr. Higgins and adopted by the committee. Chairman Horkheimer opened the discussion. He was opposed to a sinking fund as suggested by Clerk Watkins. In his plan, previously published, the city's total indebtedness is about \$732,000, including the compromise loan, and the bridge loans, which Clerk Watkins did not propose refunding in the issue that would cover the other indebtedness, he wishing to create a sinking fund to meet these when they matured; but Mr. Horkheimer favored bonds covering all the indebtedness, not issuing those covering the compromise and bridge loans until they matured, as they do, three years hence. Another set of bonds taken into consideration was the electric light, amounting to \$32,000, which mature four years hence, but as they are redeemable in payments of \$3,000 yearly, subtracted from the \$732,000 the refunding scheme is necessary to cover only \$700,000.

Mr. Horkheimer's plan would entail the cost of submitting the question only once to the people, whereas if a vote was taken to float the \$518,000, this year, and another three years hence for the compromise and bridge loans, totalling \$182,000, there would be the cost of two elections. And as under the proposed plan there would be no interest on the latter set of bonds until they were issued, the plan met with general favor. However, the committee took no final action, and adjourned after adopting the following resolution, offered by Mr. Higgins:

"Resolved, That a loan of \$700,000 be made, payable in thirty-four years, redeemable at option of city after ten years, at rate of 10 per cent per annum; \$518,000 of bonds to be issued to pay off present bonded indebtedness and other debts, including water board debt, now subject to redemption, and \$182,000 of said bonds to be held in trust to pay off two bridge loan bonds (\$100,000) and compromise loan (\$82,000) when they mature."

CLASH OF AUTHORITY.

Officer Michaels Runs in Watchman Gallagher, of the B. & O.

Last night there was a clash of authority at the Baltimore & Ohio freight station, on South street. Officer Michaels and Mr. P. B. Zane were told by two men on Market street that they had overheard a conversation on Water street from which they inferred four men were going to take a drunken stranger to the lower part of the wharf and rob him. Officer Michaels accompanied by Mr. Zane hurried down Water street. Here they separated. Mr. Zane going along the river front, while the officer started through the Baltimore & Ohio freight station. Here he was obstructed by Night Watchman Thomas Gallagher, who refused to allow the officer to go through the railroad property. The officer ended matters by arresting the altogether too officious watchman, taking him to police headquarters. He will answer the serious charge of obstructing a police officer in this morning's police court.

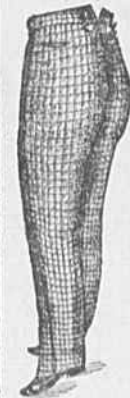
