## THE U. S. COURT

Opens Its September Term in Wheeling This Morning.

### MARSHAL THOMPSON ARRIVES

Accompanied by Charley Elliott, who has not succeeded in having the Democratic Deputies Ousted—The Matter is to Come Before Judge Goff, However, and a Reversal of Judge Jackson's Decision is Hoped for by Mr. Elliott.

The United States district court for West Virginia, with Judge John J. Jackson on the bench, opens its September term in this city to-day. The term will not be one of length, the anticipation being that it will have ended next Saturday. Aside from the well known oleomargarine cases, which have hung fire for these many moons, are to come up "dead sure" this week, and the outcome will be awaited with interest. The district attorney is to make his fight on only one of the many cases, this being against Hubbard & Paul, the Wheeling firm of wholesale grocers. The others, of course, hinge on the decision in the cases selected for prosecution. There are one or two counterfeiting cases to be heard and some liquor violations, but all will probably be completed ere the end of the week.

Among last night's arrivals were United States Marshal John K. Thompson, District Attorney Joseph H. Gaines, Clerk Ayis, of the district attorney's office, and "Charley" Elliott, who has been slated for the chief deputyship under Marshal Thompson, but is prevented from assuming his position under the decision of Judge Jackson recently, by which it was adjudged that Chief Deputy Priddle and Deputies Randolph and Ayleshire could not be ousted without cause—in other words placing these men under the protection of the civil service regulations. However, Mr. Elliott hopes that he will succeed Mr. Priddle in the near future. The case is to come up before Judge Goff, of the United States circuit court of appeals, and "Charley" hopes the Jackson decision will be reversed. In the meantime, Messrs. Priddle, Randolph and Ayleshire are holding office, but the comptroller of the treasury declines to honor orders for their salary. Judge Jackson is shortly to pass upon the matter of compelling the comptroller to pay the trio.

Governor Atkinson will be in Wheeling during the week to look after some cases in the district court. He is counsel for the oleomargarine law violators.

### THE GRAND JURY

Convenes Again this Morning After a Recess of Ten Days.

This morning the grand jury convened again after ten days' recess. Additional summonses have been issued since the grand jury took its recess, and the indications are that the matters to be considered relate to the violations of the liquor license law, which stirred up such a general feeling of unrest among saloon keepers week before last. There is no indication as to the time of the report which the grand jury will make to the criminal court.

### FUNERAL OF JAMES HEALY

Occurred Yesterday, and was Largely Attended by Friends.

Yesterday from his late residence, 70 Eighteenth street, occurred the funeral of the late James Healy, whose death has been mentioned in the Intelligencer. It was largely attended by the friends of the deceased, who was liked by all with whom he came in contact, either in business or socially. Rev. Father Altmeyer, of the Cathedral, officiated, and paid a glowing tribute to the dead man. The pallbearers were Messrs. John C. Miller, M. J. O'Kane, Robert Holmes, James McAdams, Michael Loftus, James McGinley, Patrick Fitzsimmons and James Divine. Requiem mass will be performed this morning at 9 o'clock in St. Joseph's Cathedral.

### ANOTHER TEST

Of the City's Fire Alarm System to be Made To-morrow.

To-morrow afternoon there will be another test of the city fire alarm apparatus in conformity with the agreement reached at the last meeting of the council committee on fire department. Members of this committee and a committee of the local underwriters will note the results, and should the system prove unsatisfactory, the recommendation will be made that an expert electrician put the system in shape as soon as possible.

### THE NEW TIN MILL

Laughlin Company Has Secured Real Estate, and will Begin Work Soon.

Last week the Intelligencer mentioned the plans of the Laughlin Nail Company in the direction of building a new tin plate plant, doubling its present capacity, giving employment to 375 additional workmen and involving an outlay of from \$100,000 to \$200,000. At a meeting of the Martin's Ferry city council, the company asked for the condemnation of certain streets and other concessions, all of which will be granted, insuring the early construction of the new plant.
