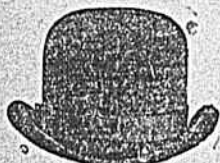

## A FAMOUS DEBATE.

The Macedonia church entertainment, which was postponed last week, will be given at the church, on Charles street, next Saturday evening. The leading feature will be the debate, which promises to be interesting to the highest pitch. There also will be good singing by Prof. Craig's chorus of twenty-five voices. The question for debate has been previously outlined in these columns, and hinges upon the question of giving the most credit to the man who rows a boat, or the man who owns the boat, in the event of rescuing a drowning person. There will be four debaters, those supporting the oarsman being Major Joseph Kinsey and J. Ross; advocates of the boat's claim, Will Justice and F. H. Hogan.

## WHITE FELLOWS.

Board of Public Works' Uniformed Street Cleaners

TO MAKE THEIR DEBUT TO-DAY.

THEY WILL OPERATE BETWEEN NINTH STREET AND THE CREEK — MR. HOWLAND, THE CREMATORY MAN, FINDS A TANGLE ON HANDS HERE — A SPECIAL MEETING OF COUNCIL THIS EVENING — CAPTAIN BENNETT'S REPORT FOR FEBRUARY.

The city board of public works held a regular meeting yesterday afternoon and after transacting routine business, including the approval of a \$500 payroll, took up the matter of street cleaning. Street Commissioner Jake Britt stated that the "white wings" street cleaning brigade was in shape to begin operations as soon as the weather is propitious.

It was decided to place the "white wings" in service this morning for the first time. Street Commissioner Britt has detailed his uniformed men as follows: Turner, Ninth street to Market alley; Davis, Market alley to Twelfth street; Young, Twelfth to Fourteenth street; Taylor, Fourteenth street to the creek.

These men will have the new carts recently secured by the board, and will clean Market and Main streets and the side streets in their respective beats.

## THE NEW CREMATORY.

B. F. Howland, the Philadelphia man who recently was given by ordinance of council the privilege of erecting a garbage utilizing plant on the Baltimore & Ohio property in the Sixth ward, arrived in the city yesterday afternoon, and will attempt to unravel the tangle into which affairs have fallen recently. As matters are, Mr. Howland seems to have no site in the Sixth ward. To-day he will attempt to secure a site for his plant, and the matter will probably come up in some shape at the meeting of council to-night. Mr. Howland states he is ready to go ahead as soon as the trouble about a location for his plant is settled.

## CITY PAY DAY.

Yesterday was a city pay day. Firemen, policemen and city officials received in the aggregate about \$5,000.

## COUNCIL TO-NIGHT.

This evening a special meeting of the city council will be held. It is made necessary by the failure of council to secure a quorum for the regular meeting scheduled for last Tuesday evening. Considerable routine business will be transacted.

## CHIEF BENNETT'S REPORT.

Chief of Police Thomas D. Bennett's report for the month of February shows the following:

Number of arrests, 89; males, white 51, colored 2; number of females, white 48, colored, none; males sent to city prison, 14; females sent to county jail, 5; fines paid, 60; suspended, 4; dismissed, 16; amount of fines and costs assessed, \$732.05; collected, \$577.90.

## A VERDANT FORGER.

Young Man Arrested Who Didn't Know What He Was Doing.

Yesterday morning, on complaint of Proprietor Bott, of Bott's hotel, on the South Side, Officer Bickerton made an important arrest. His capture was Lewis Meyers, alias George Miller, alias George Martin. His crime was the writing of a check with another man's name at the bottom. The check was for \$22, and was drawn on the Bank of Wheeling. It was given in payment of a \$20 board bill. Bott's suspicions were aroused and the arrest followed. Meyers, who, it seems, came to Wheeling from New Philadelphia, Ohio, said he did not know he was doing anything wrong when he wrote the bad check, but of course that statement must be taken with a grain of salt. Coming across the bridge, Meyers attempted to throw away some blank checks, but Lieutenant Bickerton was too quick for him, and the checks will probably figure as evidence against the young man, who was committed to jail by Justice Rogers in default of \$2,000 bail, to await the action of the criminal court grand jury. Meyers has a wife in New Philadelphia. At first he claimed Trenton, N. J., and Philadelphia as his place of residence.

## KINDLEBERGER COMING

With Kapy, the Hotel Forger, Who was Arrested in Louisville.

Sheriff H. C. Richards last evening received a telegram from Deputy Sheriff John W. Kindleberger, stating that the judge of the Louisville city court had turned over to him Sigmund Kapy, the man wanted in this city for passing a forged check for \$40 at the Hotel Windsor. Kindleberger also stated that he expected to reach Wheeling with his man at 3:45 o'clock this afternoon over the Ohio River railroad.

Kapy is wanted in St. Louis and other cities for similar offenses, but the Wheeling case got first chance, and there is a good case against him.

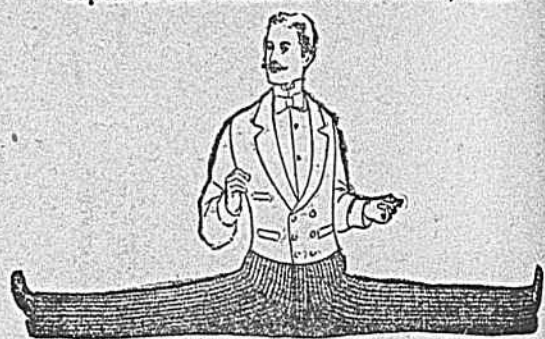

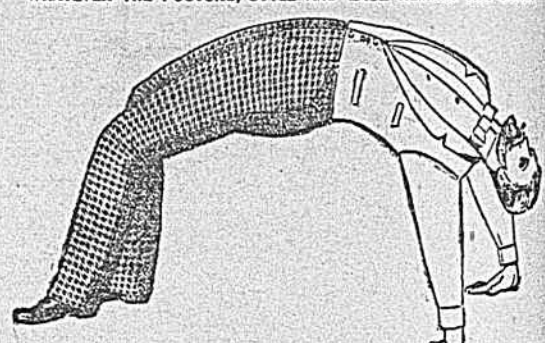
