CLIMBING UP.

Captain Willis' Company has now 75 Members

ORDERS TO HURRY UP RECEIVED

YESTERDAY FROM THE ADJUTANT GENERAL WHO INFORMED CAPTAIN WILLIS THAT HIS COMPANY MAY BE CALLED ON AT A MOMENT'S NOTICE. NEIGHBORING TOWNS FURNISHING RECRUITS—A PARTIAL LIST OF THE WHEELING MEMBERS.

Captain Willis' company had a splendid turnout and drill in the Hub building last night. More recruits were out than on any previous evening, and the company bids fair to present a soldierly appearance before long. Last night Captain Willis said he had received word from Adjutant General Appleton, hurrying the formation of the company, and informing him that the Wheeling boys may be called on at any moment. The company will soon be up to its full strength, and Wheeling men desiring a place in it should lose no time in enrolling themselves, for names for the company are being received at Grafton, Cameron, Moundsville and three other points. At all of these places squads are being drilled, and will be mustered into the company when orders to move to the mobilizing point in this state are received. Captain Willis took occasion to refer last night to the movement on foot to provide the company with Cuban campaign uniforms, which he hoped would be successful.

The enrollment has reached seventy-five men, several being taken in last night. Matters of Minor Moment in and About the City.

The board of county commissioners met yesterday afternoon in auditing session and transacted routine business. Council meets in special session tomorrow evening. Instead of this evening, the postponement being made yesterday.
