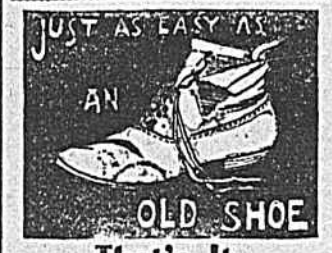

## THE REUNION.

The Finance Committee will begin its Work Next Week.

### THE PROSPECTS ARE EXCELLENT

FOR THE NEEDED FUNDS BEING RAISED WITHOUT DIFFICULTY. THE COMMITTEE HAS DIVIDED ITS WORK AMONG SUB-COMMITTEES—DISCUSSION REGARDING THE SITE FOR THE REUNION. CAMP CARLISLE OR THE FAIR GROUNDS WILL WIN.

The Society of the Army of West Virginia reunion committee on finance held a meeting yesterday afternoon at the office of Colonel Morris Horkheimer, one of its members, and decided to at once begin the work of soliciting funds to defray the reunion expenses. The committee has been divided into three sub-committees, to each of which was assigned a section in the business part of the city, where its operations will be confined. These sections are as follows: Sub-committee No. 1.—From the creek to the south side of Twelfth street, inclusive, and from Main street to the river, inclusive. Sub-committee No. 2.—From north side of Twelfth street to Ninth street, and Main street to river, inclusive. Sub-committee No. 3.—Market street, from the creek to Tenth street, and the side streets to the east side of Main. The meeting was attended by Chairman Rawling, of the executive committee, who was requested to send a circular letter to persons whom the committee desires contributions from. This circular will precede the personal visit from the committee.

The executive committee has not yet taken up the matter of the location of the reunion grounds, but it seems probable at this time that either historic Camp Carlisle—the bridge park—or the state fair grounds will be selected in the near future. The old war time camp has the advantage of historic associations intimately connected with the organization whose reunion is to be held here, and in addition is located on the street car lines and easy of access. These advantages are in a measure offset by the buildings on the fair grounds which would be sub-let to privilege men and thus become a source of considerable revenue. In addition, it seems likely that before the reunion time arrives there will be street car accommodations right at the fair grounds entrance. In fact, if council passes favorably on the proposed street car line ordinance to-night, it is assured that the new line will be in operation before the state fair, which is to be held two weeks before the reunion next September.
