THE FOOL KILLER.—We shall have to send again for the fool killer. Knowing the great destruction of human life which must ensue upon his arrival, we have some hesitation in inviting the fabled monster, but we don't see how we are to find relief in any other way. Some time ago we had occasion to speak rather disparingly of the style of valentines that are offered for sale in the shop windows, when a dealer in the vulgar daubs discontinued his patronage, alleging as a reason that we had designedly injured his business .-We intended to send for the fool killer at that time, but did'nt. Some weeks later we spoke, locally, of a certain vegetable which is said to be, if not poisonous, at least very detrimental to health, whereupon a certian green grocer discontinued his paper. This time we did send for the fool killer, but his daties over in Ohio, among the Vallandighamers, rendered it impossible for him to come over here and meet his engagements elsewhere. Our habit is, in speaking of those highly respectable gentlemen, the Aldermen, to designate the official, for the sake of brevity, "A-l-d." Yesterday a young man took us to task for calling his uncle, who is an Alderman, old so and so. The young man could not distinguish between "Old" and "Ald." And now the fool killer must come, and he will be instructed, first thing, to attend to this young In view of the instances we have men-

tioned, and many that we have not mentioned, we think it would not be a bad idea to establish a numerous corps of fool killers. We will undertake to find employment for a small squad among our immediate acquaintances.

OUTRAGEOUS BRUTALITY .- A gentleman who resides in the city suburbs informs us that within the past two or three months several of his pigs have been found dead with great gashes in their sides. He was not able to account for the singular decease of his unoffending porkers, and searched and investigated in vain. At last he permitted himself to entertain the supersticious notion that some avenging Jibbenainosay was going about seeking the destruction of swine. What was the gentleman's surprise, after such a long period of doubt and suspense, to discover that his pigs had been killed by boys, whose only object was to get the bladders The bladders were doubtless taken from the pigs while they were yet alive.

The ponies are about as large as a common sized three weeks' colt and are very wild looking and spirited animals. The jack is not much larger than a common stock hog. They are being conveyed to Sunfish more for curious ornament than for use.

Afternoon Report.

Gen. Gilmore's Reply in Answer to Beauregard's Communication. Washington, September 2 —The following is Gen. Gilmore's reply in brief, a notice of which has been published in the rebel papers, to Gen. Beauregard's communication, already printed at length: Department of the South, Headquarters in the Field, Morris Island, Saturday, August

22, 9 P. M.—Sin: I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of this date, complaining that our batteries had opened upon the city of Charleston and thrown a number of heavy rifle shells into the city, the inhabitants of which, of course, were asleep and unaware of my letter to you demanding the surren der of Fort Sumter and Morris Island, and threatening in default thereof to open fire upon Charleston, was delivered near Fort Wagner at 11:15 A. M., of the 21st inst., and should have reached your headquarters in time to have permitted your reply to reach me within the limited space named, four hours. The fact that you were absent from headquarters at the time of its arrival may be regarded as an unfortunate cir-cumstance for the city of Charleston, but it is one for which I clearly am not responsible. This letter bore date at my headquarters, and was officially delivered by an officer of my staff. The inadvertant neglect of my signature doubtless affords grounds for special pleading, but it is not the 'argument of a commander solicitous only for the safety of sleeping women and ehildren and unarmed men.
Your threats of retaliation for acts of

mine which you do not allege to be in violation of the usages of civilzed warfare, except as regards to the length of time allowed as notice of my intention, are passed without comment. I will however call your attention to the first established principle that the commander of a place attacked, yet not invested, having his avenues of escape open and practicable, has no right to a notice of an intention of bombardment other than that which is given by the threatening attitude of his adver-sary. Even had not this letter been written the city of Charleston has had, according to your own computation, forty days' no-tice of her danger. During that time my attack upon her defences has steadily pro-gressed. The ultimate object of that attack has at no time been doubtful. If under the circumstance the life of a single non-combatant is exposed to peril by the bombardment of the city, the responsibili-ty rests with those who have first failed to remove the non-combatants or to secure the safety of the city after having control of all its approaches for a period of nearly two years and a half in the presence of a threatening force, and who afterwards refused to accept the terms upon which the bombardment might have been postponed. ombardment might have been postponed. mise, I have been led to believe that most of the women and children of Charleston, were long since removed from that city, but upon your assurance that the city is still full of them, I shall suspend the bom-bardment until 11 o'clock to-morrow even-ing, thus giving you two days from this ime to have received my communication
