THE WILD IRISHMAN.
New Through Schedule Over the G. C. & N. Railway.

Last Sunday night the Wild Irishman started out of Atlanta over the G. C. & N. Railway and reached Abbeville on schedule time—ten o'clock.

Quite a number of odds and ends of citizens assembled at the depot to see it make its first trip, and give Abbeville the grand honour, so to speak, but contrary to expectation it stopped to let off and take on passengers.

A little before ten o'clock the reflected rays of the headlights of the engine were seen at the coal chute, and in a little while the engine began to creep down the hill toward the depot, where the crowd was standing. At 8:35 telegraph operator J. A. Scott signalled, when Conductor Murphy pulled the bell cord, and Engineer Garrison brought engine and train to a standstill at the station.

Half an hour before ten o'clock James King, Moses Mettewether and John Neal applied for tickets to Greenwood. Night telegraph operator and ticket agent J. A. Scott, not knowing where to sell the tickets, applied his fingers to the little tinker on the ticket answerer and the ticket was sent.

A little later John W. Sign, Jr., applied for a ticket to Clinton, which was furnished. These four made up the local train which left Abbeville on the first train by the new schedule. Everybody on the incoming train jumped off as soon as the train stopped.

The train consisted of a mail and express coach, two passenger coaches and two sleepers. The "through passengers" on the sleepers did not get up to see us and we did not go through the train to see them.

Exactly at ten o'clock the engine bell sounded and the train began to move. In the shortest sort of time it was skimming along the track at a rapid rate, and was soon out of sight, though we could still hear the clatter of the wheels as the train went toward Long Cane.

This train makes but one regular stop in South Carolina, and that is at Chester. Abbeville, Greenwood and Clinton are "flag stations" at which this train will always stop, if passengers desire to stop, and whether they have passengers aboard or not, they will always stop if the operator will signal.

The new schedule is a desirable one. As yet it is made of ordinary cars, but in August their new and splendid vestibule trains will be put on the road.
