At 9.55 telegraph operator J. A. Scott signalied, when Conductor Murphy pulled the bell cord, and Engineer Garrison brought engine 501 and the train to a standstill at the station.

Half an hour before ten o'clock James King, Mose Merriwether and John Neal, applied for tickets to Greenwood. Night telegraph operator and ticket agent J. A. Scott, not knowing whether to sell the tickets, applied his fingers to the little ticker on the table in the office, and in a little while the little ticker answered, and the tickets were sold. A little later John W. Sign, Jr., applied for a ticket to Clinton, which was furnished. These four made up the local travel from Abbeville on the first train by the new schedule. Everybody on the incoming train jumped off as soon as the train stopped.

The train consisted of a mail and express coach, two passenger coaches and two sleepers. The "through passengers" on the sleepers did not get up to see us and we did not go through the train to see them.

Exactly at ten o'clock the engine bell sounded and the train began to move. In the shortest sort of time it went skimming along the track at a rapid rate, and was soon out of sight, though we could still hear the clatter of the wheels as the train went toward Long Cane.

This train makes but one regular stop in South Carolina, and that is at Chester. Abbe-ville, Green wood and Clinton are "fing sta-tions," at which this train will always stop, if pessengers desire to stop, and whether they have passengers aboard or not, they will al-ways stop if the operator will signal.
