TO PROTECT NEGROES.

Federal Department of Justice About to Open Fight For Southern Negroes Before Supreme Court—Arises Out of Arkansas Affair.

Washington, D. C. (Special.)—Roosevelt's Department of Justice is about to fight a battle for the negroes of the South before the Supreme Court. The United States that the administration hopes will bring the recalcitrant of the Brownsville affair. Attorney General Bonaparte has been ordered by the court to file a brief in support of his case, and the struggle is now on. The case arises out of an alleged attempt of white men of Arkansas to frighten negroes from working for the Arkansas Lumber Company, away from their jobs. Notices were posted warning the negroes from continuing at work. In this connection a half dozen white men were convicted of violating the federal statute, enacted just after the adoption of the thirteenth amendment to the constitution, which makes it an offense to conspire to threaten or intimidate any citizen in the free exercise of his rights. The case is more than a year ago, the Supreme Court has ruled in another case, certain men who had been convicted of a similar offense. With this situation, and it is understood, upon orders from the president, the attorney general, unwilling to entrust the task to a subordinate, himself has prepared to plead the cause of the colored men. In addition to his brief, already filed with the Supreme Court, Bonaparte is expected to argue the case orally before the court when it comes up in about ten days for hearing.

"To be free is to be wholly free," says Bonaparte in his brief. "It does not mean that a man may merely have his personal liberties and at the same time be hedged about by prohibitions and restrictions and denied first and right and then another right. It means that he can have his full constitutional right unless he is in no sense whatever to involuntary servitude, and he may claim the protection of Federal law, if enacted by Congress, against the first infringement of his freedom. IN ACCORDANCE WITH AN ACT to raise supplies for the fiscal year commencing January 1, 1907, notice is hereby given that the office of County Treasurer for Abbeville County will be open for the collection of taxes for said fiscal year from Tuesday, October 15th, until Thursday, December 31st, without penalty. A penalty of one per cent on all taxes not paid on January 1st, 1908. A penalty of seven per cent on all taxes not paid on March 1st, 1908.

Carmel..... 4 " Willington..... 4 " McCormick..... 4 " Fondville..... 4 " Warrenton..... 4 " A poll tax of One Dollar per capita on all male citizens between the age of 21 and 60 years, except such as are exempt by law, will be collected. A commutation road tax of One Dollar will be collected the same time as other taxes from all male citizens between the ages of 18 and 60 years, except such as are exempted by law. Unless said tax is paid by the first of March, 1908, eight days work upon the public highways will be required under an overseer, if so much be necessary. Taxes are payable only in gold and silver coin, United States currency, National Bank Notes and Coupons of State Bonds which become payable during the year 1907. A tax of 50 cents will be collected on each dog. As so few avail themselves of the opportunity of paying taxes at the times and places heretofore designated, I will discontinue the appointments over the County, and collect all taxes at the Treasurer's office. Parties desiring information by mail in regard to their taxes will please write before December 10th, stating the location of their property, and inclose postage for reply, and those paying by check must inclose the charge for collection.

An Ordinance

To Raise Supplies for the City of Abbeville, S. C., for the Fiscal Year 1908.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND Aldermen of the City of Abbeville, S. C., in Council assembled and by authority of the same, That a tax for the same and in a manner hereinafter named shall be raised and paid into the treasury of the City Council for the use and purposes thereof for the fiscal year 1908.

Notice is hereby given that the office of City Treasurer of Abbeville, S. C., will be open for the collection of taxes for said fiscal year 1908, from Friday, November 1st, 1907, until Wednesday, January 1st, 1908, without penalty.

Rate per centum of taxation are as follows:

City Tax..... 3 mills Water Works Tax (interest on Bonds and Sinking Funds)..... 2 1/2 mills Sewerage..... 1 1/2 mills

That when the taxes and assessments or any portion thereof charged against the property or partly on the tax books of the City for the fiscal year 1908, shall not be paid on or before the first day of January, 1908, the City Treasurer shall proceed to add a penalty of one per cent on the tax book, and the City Treasurer shall collect the same; and if the said taxes and assessments and penalties are not paid on or before the first day of February next thereafter, an additional penalty of one per cent thereon shall be added by the City Treasurer; and if said taxes, assessments and penalties are not paid on or before the first day of March next thereafter, an additional penalty of five per centum thereon shall be added by the City Treasurer and be collected by him; and if the said taxes, assessments and penalties are not paid on or before the 15th day of March next thereafter, the said City Treasurer shall issue his tax execution for the said taxes, assessments and penalties against the property of the defaulting taxpayers according to law.

A commutation road tax will be collected the same time as other taxes of Two Dollars from all male citizens between the ages of eighteen and fifty-five years, except those exempted by law. Unless said tax is paid on or before the 1st day of January, 1908, six days work upon the public highways and streets of the City will be required under the Street Overseer.

All persons failing or refusing to pay the commutation tax or to work six full days, shall, upon conviction, be fined not more than Thirty Dollars or be imprisoned not longer than thirty days.
