An unsuccessful attempt at lynching was made here Wednesday morning by an armed mob of 100 men from Calhoun Falls. The intended victim was Will Willeford, a 15-year-old negro, charged with cutting a white boy named Ayers at Calhoun Falls last Saturday.

Jailer Cox, warned of the attempt, spirited the prisoner away in time to save his life. There being no prisoners in the jail, the mob dispersed, after searching the premises. There was no disorder.

Sheriff Lyon kept the prisoner under strong guard all night and carried him to Columbia for safekeeping.

Ayers is said to be in a serious condition in a hospital at Greenwood.
