ABBEVILLE TEAM DEFEATS THEIR RIVALS OF OLD YESTERDAY

Abbeville won the first game of the series with Greenwood Thursday on the local diamond by the score of 6 to 5. Allen did the hurling for Abbeville while Ethridge carried the burden for Greenwood. Allen, Abbeville's star hurler, was touched for but six hits and was steady in the pinches. Ethridge was hit rather freely although he pitched a good game. He got one hit off Allen which was good for three bases, the only triple of the game.

Bradley for Greenwood in left field made several pretty catches, one in particular. Monroe for Greenwood also did fine fielding.

Rain halted the game for twenty minutes at the beginning of the fifth inning, but play was resumed and the game continued without interruption until Umpire Owings made a rotten decision on a play at home plate. Then came a swarm of mad fans on the diamond, and the force had to be used to keep some from the umpire. This was soon cleared up and play was again resumed.

While fielding a ball over second in the ninth and trying to force a man at that base, Robert Galloway fell over the bag and was struck in the back by the runner. He was hurt badly and time was called for awhile, but he again took his place at short-stop and stayed in for the rest of the game.

The batting feature of the game was the hitting of Big Bruce Galloway who secured three hits the first three times at the bat, two going for singles and one for a double. Galloway E. and Clark each secured a double and a single out of four times at the bat, while Reames got two singles out of four times at the bat.

10,000,000 BALE CROP SAYS COMMISSIONER HARRIS

Advices the Farmers to Look Out For Higher Prices in 1923. "Sit Steady in Boat."

Columbia, July 27.—B. Harris, commissioner of agriculture gave out the following statement yesterday: "The government report of June 25 of 72.4 could not be considered a bearish report. I do not think that we will have a ten per cent increase in acreage on account of the floods and wet season. If it had not been for the floods and wet late season I think the acreage increase would have been fifteen per cent. However the good Lord has taken special charge of the cotton situation this year. For the last two years on the issuance of the government monthly crop report the bear speculators were able to drive the cotton market down no matter how bullish the report was but this was not the case with the June 25 report notwithstanding a threatened railroad strike and coal miners strike. Heretofore any kind of a strike talked of could drive cotton down. All this goes to prove that spot cotton has a stronger position than it has had in the last two years. I want to advise spot holders of cotton not to sell a bale unless they are obliged to as we are now facing a world famine in cotton and we cannot make as much cotton this year as the world will need for next year's consumption. Our crop this year will not reach over ten million bales and it will take ideal seasons from now on to make this amount. You are bound to see high cotton in 1923. Sit steady in the boat and keep out of debt this year. Let this be your watchword."

PREPARE TO BURN OIL.

Chicago Concerns Getting Ready For Coal Famine. Chicago, July 27.—Several Chicago industrial plants were preparing against a possible shortage of coal by hurriedly equipping furnaces and boilers with facilities for burning oil as fuel, it was learned here today. Thirty per cent of the city's pumping stations and incinerators have been equipped with oil burners, according to Deputy's Commissioner Burkehardt. The cement industry is beginning to feel the pinch of restricted coal supplies, William M. Kinney, general manager of the Portland Cement Association, said in a statement.

Some plants he added have been forced to close and it is probable others may have to do so or operate on part time unless relief is had soon. If we remember that most people in South Carolina are not drinking enough milk, maybe that will help along our infant dairy industry, now on its first legs.
