McCORMICK PHYSICIAN DIES IN PHILADELPHIA

McCormick Nov. 28.—The body of Dr. J. Carl Harmon, who died Saturday in Philadelphia will be brought here this afternoon for burial. Dr. Harmon was a graduate of Wofford College and of the Jefferson Medical College in Philadelphia. During the World War he was a Lieutenant in the medical corps of the army. He practiced in McCormick for two years, but left here early this month for Bryn Mawr, Pa., to take up practice there. Death was due to blood poisoning developing from a scratch on his face. He is survived by his widow and his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Harmon, of McCormick and three brothers.

Carlos Corbitt Abandons Appeal

Orangeburg, S. C. Nov. 28.—Carlos Corbitt who in March 1920, killed three men at his home near here, and who last May was sentenced to serve eighteen years in prison, apparently has abandoned his fight liberty, it became known here today. Announcement was made that Sheriff R. Fulton Duke would convey him to the state penitentiary on Tuesday to begin serving sentence.

Removal of Corbitt to the penitentiary ends a bitter legal fight extending over two years.
