in the State, gives no right to vote.

The Managers of the Elections throughout the State be restrained from publishing notices of Elections in the newspapers, more than twice a week for one month, and on the days of Election; that in the Parish of St. Phillip's and St. Michael's, the notice of the Elections shall be published in one newspaper only, for the sum of fifty dollars; that in each other District, in one gazette, for the sum of \$12 50; and where no gazette is published in the District, the Managers shall put up notices of the Election at three or more public places and at every place of Election within the Dis trict; that the Managers of Election throughont the State shall give reasonable notice of the Election, and at least two Sundays previous to

the Election.
