STATE OF SOUTH CAROLINA.
EXECUTIVE CHAMBER.

To the Commissioners of Election for the County of Edgefield:

WHEREAS a vacancy exists in the office of Judge of Probate for the County of Edgefield, occasioned by the death of Hon. J. D. Allen, who was elected at the General Election of 1910.

AND WHEREAS the unexpired term is for a longer period than one year and can only be filled by election:

NOW, THEREFORE, you are hereby required to order an election for Judge of Probate for Edgefield County to serve the remainder of the term for which Hon. J. D. Allen was elected.

The Polls to be opened the Nineteenth day of December 1911, and the election to be conducted according to the laws regulating General Elections.

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of the State to be affixed, at Columbia, this eighteenth day of November, A. D. 1911, and in the 136th year of the United States of America.

Notice of Election.

State of South Carolina—County of Edgefield:

Notice is hereby given that the General Election for Judge of Probate will be held at the voting precincts fixed by law in the county of Edgefield on Tuesday, December 19th 1911.

The qualifications for suffrage are as follows:

Residence in state for two years, in the county one year, in the polling precinct in which the elector offers to vote, four months, and the payment six months before any election of any poll tax then due and payable: Provided, That ministers in charge of an organized church and teachers of public schools shall be entitled to vote after six months residence in the state, if otherwise qualified:

Managers of election must require the voter the production of a registration certificate and proof of the payment of all taxes, including poll tax, assessed and collectible during the previous year. The production of a certificate or the receipt of the officer authorized to collect such taxes shall be conclusive proof of the payment thereof.

Before the hour fixed for opening the polls managers and clerks must take and subscribe to the Constitutional oath. The chairman of the board of managers can administer the oath to the other managers and the clerk; a notary public must administer the oath to chairman. The managers elect their chairman and clerk.

Polls at each voting place must be opened at 7 o'clock a. m., and closed at 4 o'clock p. m.

The managers have the power to fill a vacancy; and if none of the managers attend, the citizens can elect, from among the qualified voters. The managers and clerk must proceed publicly to open the ballot boxes and count the ballots therein and continue without adjournment until the same is completed, and make a statement of the result for each office, and sign name. Within three days thereafter, the chairman of the board, or some one designated by the board, must deliver to the commissioners of election the poll list, the boxes containing the ballots and written statements of the result of the election.

Treasurer's Notice.

The County Treasurer's office will be open for the purpose of receiving taxes from the 15th day of Oct., 1911, to the 15th day of March, 1912, inclusive.

A penalty of one per cent will be added to all unpaid taxes after the 1st day of January to the 31st of January 1912, of two per cent, from the 1st day of February to the last day of February 1912 and penalty of five per cent from the first day of March to the 15th day of March, 1912.

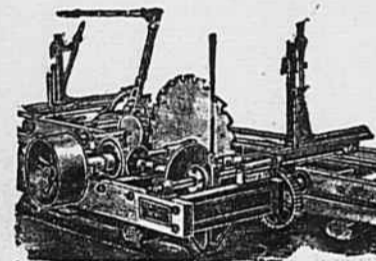

All male citizens between the ages of 21 years and 60 years except those exempt by law are liable to a poll tax of one dollar each. A capitation tax of 50 cents each is to be paid of all dogs.

The law prescribes that all male citizens between the ages of 18 and 55 years must pay a \$2 commutation tax or work six days on the public roads. As this is optional with the individual, no commutation tax is included in the property tax. So ask for road tax receipt when you desire to pay road tax. Positively no taxes received after 15th of March.
