The commercial editor of the Memphis Avalanche, writing on the 20th instant, says:

The condition of the cotton crops are less favorable than they were a week since. Continued heavy rains are doing cotton fields injury, filling them with grass, and rotting the maturing bolls. Several planters from the valley lands South of us are gloomy over the prospect. The hill crops have sustained much less injury, and dry weather from this out may yet afford a great a yield as the picking capacity can get out.

CROPS IN THE STATE. - The Unionville Times, of the 26th in. stant, says:

Cotton and corn in this county are looking as well as those crops have for many years. We have examined a number of cotton fields, and are pleased to notice that, generally, the cotton stalks have a larger number of sound bolls than we ever saw in this State. We, however, regret to state that the caterpillar has made its ap pearance, and much apprehension is felt about it. At present, no mischief has been done by these marauders, but the fact that they have perceptibly increased in numbers during the past week, give ground for alarm. "Clean out the bottom of the hoof thoroughly-hold up the leg so as to bring the bottom of the hoof upward, holding it firmly in a horizontal position, and pour in, say a tablespoonful of spirits of turpentine if the cavity of the hoof will hold that much-if not, pour in what it will hold, without danger of running over; touch the turpentine with a red hot iron (this will set it on fire)-hold the hoof firmly in position until it all burns out. Great care must be taken that none runs over on the hair or the hoof lest the skin be burned. If all the feet are affected, burn turpentine in each of them. 


