W. H. ARIAL.

Rev. A. W. Lamar preached to a large and appreciative congregation at Sacona church on last Saturday and Sunday. He also preached in the Methodist church in this place on Saturday evening. His earnest and eloquent preaching throughout this county we think has done much good, and "like bread cast upon the waters, may be taken up many days hence."

An interesting protracted meeting of eight days duration has been concluded at Mount Carmel church in this county. There were four accessions, two by experience and two by letter. The meeting was conducted by the Rev. W. B. Singleton of this county, assisted by Rev. Mr. Stone, of Greenville.

THE ROADS.—The public roads are generally in bad condition, and as the people are now done "laying by," we trust the Commissioners will have them worked out and put in good order, all over the County. Of course it was not expected of the people that they should do the work before they were through with their crops, but they are now through and have more leisure than at any other season of the year, and we hope the commissioners will give their overseers instructions to warn out their hands and work their roads without delay. At this time we do not know of but one section of road which has been worked, and that is the first section on the road leading from this place to Pumpkintown and Eastate, under charge of Mr. W. M. Ferguson, which has been put in good condition. Of course the commissioners will do their duty about the matter, and we say this merely as a reminder to them.

CLUB MEETING.—The Democratic Club at this place met in the Court House on last Saturday. The meeting was a very interesting one and all the members present seemed to be fully imbued with the importance of the conflict before us. The Rev. A. W. Lamar was present, and by invitation addressed the club. He stated that he desired it to be distinctly understood that he was not a politician in any sense of the word, and did not propose to make a political speech, but as a citizen of South Carolina, he felt a deep interest in the welfare and prosperity of his State. The good people of South Carolina had been traduced and misrepresented so much and so persistently that he feared they had lost their manhood. If they would rise up in their manhood and assert their God-given rights, they could redeem the State and give to the whole people good government, peace and prosperity. He very eloquently and earnestly advised the club to be careful what kind of men they assisted in putting in office—rum suckers and gamblers should not be elected to any office, but men of sober habits and good moral character should be the men selected to receive their suffrages. His speech was frequently applauded and highly appreciated by the club. The resolution of the County Executive Committee relative to a plurality vote for candidates was ratified by the club. A resolution introduced by Mr. S. D. Keith, requesting the County Executive Committee to devise and recommend a plan for conducting the primary election, in order to have uniformity in all the clubs in the county, was adopted. The club is growing very rapidly, and will do good service in the approaching campaign.

Meeting of County Democratic Executive Committee.

Persuant to adjournment, the County Executive Committee met at the Court House, on Monday, the 3d inst. Present, R. E. Bowen, Chairman; D. F. Bradley, Secretary; J. R. Gossett, W. G. Field, B. J. Johnson, J. E. Borroughs, W. T. Field and John T. Lewis. Rev. G. W. Singleton was admitted as proxy for V. S. Jones, member from Pumpkintown club. Reports from each club as to action on primary plan of election for candidates, was received, as follows: Pickensville club, adopted; Liberty club, rejected; Garvin club, adopted; Easley club, adopted; Pickens Court House club, adopted; Dacusville club, adopted; Pumpkintown club, adopted; Eastate club, adopted. A majority of the clubs having adopted the plan, the following preamble and resolutions were then presented and unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, A majority of the Democratic clubs in the county having adopted the plan of primary election for candidates, as proposed by the Executive Committee, and whereas, it is made the duty of said committee to designate the time for holding said election, therefore, be it

Resolved, That each club meet on Friday, the 18th day of August, 1876, at 10 o'clock, A. M., and proceed to receive votes for candidates, as proposed, until 4 o'clock, P. M. or as much later as may be necessary, to afford all members of the club an opportunity of voting.

Resolved, That each club be entitled to five delegates to the county convention, and that said convention convene at the Court House, on Saturday following, the 19th, for the purpose of carrying out the duties imposed by the said plan of primary election, and for the discharge of such other duties as may properly come before it.

Resolved, That it was the intention of the Executive Committee that the candidate receiving a plurality, or highest number of votes, (but not a majority, as published in the proposition) should be the candidate of the party.

Resolved, That each club, when it meets to vote for candidates, be requested to ratify the above declaratory resolution, and vote for candidates with that understanding.

Resolutions submitted from Pickensville, Garvin and Easley clubs, were laid on the table. Committee then adjourned to meet on Saturday in August next.
