BLACKSBURG BUDGET.

Similar Weather In 1877—Telephone Connections—Death of Mrs. McKee—Other Notes.

Correspondence of the Yorkville Enquirer.

BLACKSBURG, April 21.—The hot and dry season through which we have been sweating for nearly two weeks has no precedent within the memory of our most observing citizens, but the weather bureau man claims to have a record for just such weather during the month of April in 1877, one quarter of a century ago. We are glad it doesn't come oftener. The temperature has been bearing about 95 for several days; but the gentle kindly breeze has tempered the heat and our farmers have been able to get a good deal of work done in the way of planting lands which had already been prepared.

Blacksburg is soon to be in telephonic connection with Gaffneys, and Cherokee Falls, and in that way with Spartanburg and Greenville. Mr. D. L. Brown of this place and the Gaffney City Telephone company are having the lines erected and Mr. W. C. Black, of our town is superintending the work.

To the many attractions of her elegant home, Mrs. M. E. Deal has added a lawn tennis court on the northeast corner of her spacious grounds.

The numerous friends of Dr. McKee, of Cherokee Falls, will be grieved to hear of the death of his wife, which occurred on Thursday afternoon, the 16th instant. She left a babe only a few hours old.

The new part or western end of Cherokee Falls cotton mill has been completed and is being filled with machinery. The floor space of the building will now cover about three acres of ground.

Dr. J. T. Darwin has purchased the handsome and attractive dwelling from Mr. Allen Crosby, where he lived when a resident of Blacksburg.

TO THE POPULISTS.—Senator Marion Butler, chairman of the North Carolina Populist committee, has issued an address to that party in which he says: "We cannot too earnestly urge upon the People's party the necessity and importance of making this campaign for the vital principle of free and unlimited coinage of gold and silver at the ratio of 16 to 1, and for financial reform and other vital issues, cordially inviting men of all shades of political belief and former party affiliations to co-operate with us upon the fundamental principles of the People's party. Your State committee is fully agreed that organization in counties and districts should begin at once and be pressed vigorously, but the nomination of candidates for various offices should be postponed until after the national convention at St. Louis and the course of our political opponents shall have been laid down. Let us make this campaign for honest principles of government, and may God defend the right."

SMALLS IS SMART.—There is a bill pending in congress with pretty good prospects of passage, to give Bob Smalls \$20,000 for his services in stealing the steamer Planter out of Charleston harbor during the war and getting her safely past Fort Sumter. Smalls has been lobbying for the bill for some time past, and if a story of the Washington Post is true, he has been doing some pretty good work. It was generally understood, of course, that Smalls would be a delegate to St. Louis. Before the bill could be gotten safely on its way, it was necessary to secure the favor of Reed in the house, and Allison, chairman of the appropriations committee of the senate. These men are rival candidates for the presidential nomination. Over on the senate side Smalls took care to intimate that he was for Allison and on the house side he was for Reed. When the bill was finally reported Smalls went home and was elected a delegate to St. Louis with instructions to vote for McKinley. But this won't interfere much. The appropriation bill has already gotten well on its way, and Smalls will vote in the convention as he pleases.

SOUTH CAROLINA NEWS.

Watts-McIver.

Judge R. C. Watts and Miss Lottie McIver, daughter of Chief Justice McIver, were married in Cheraw last Thursday afternoon. They shortly afterward left on an extended trip through the North.

Tillman Badges.

Columbia Register: Several state house officials yesterday received some badges of the Tillman club which has been formed in Denver, where Tillman recently received such an ovation on the occasion of his visit and address there. The badge is of red silk, with a picture of Tillman at the top and crossed laurel twigs just beneath. A pitchfork crosses the badge, and the words, "The Tillman Club, Denver, 1896, 16 to 1," are printed on it.

Aughtry Is Convicted.

After remaining out 20 hours and 39 minutes, the Richland jury in the case of Thomas C. Aughtry, charged with the murder of Conway B. Oliver, in Columbia, on the night of March 5, 1895, returned with a verdict of guilty and a recommendation to the mercy of the court. The verdict was published at 2 o'clock last Friday afternoon, and Aughtry's counsel immediately gave notice of a motion for a new trial. Under the verdict and with the recommendation, Aughtry must be sentenced to life imprisonment in the penitentiary.

South Carolina Exposition Company.

The Spartanburg convention completed its work last week by organizing the South Carolina Exposition company composed of the delegates to the convention and other citizens to be appointed. Governor Evans is president, Wm. A. Courtenay, of Charleston, is vice president and E. L. Roche, commissioner. The capital stock is to be \$10,000 and the local work is to be under the direction of a board of county commissioners com-

posed of one member from each county. The commissioner appointed for York county is Mr. W. B. Moore, of Yorkville.

YORKVILLE, S. C., April 22, 1896.

NOTICE is hereby given to each and every Democratic club in York county to assemble at their respective places of meeting on SATURDAY, MAY 2, 1896, at 1 o'clock, p. m., for the purpose of electing delegates and alternates to a Democratic county convention which the hereby call to meet in the COURTHOUSE at Yorkville, on MONDAY, THE 4TH DAY OF MAY, 1896, at 11 o'clock, a. m., for the purpose of electing a new executive committee. Delegates also elect of electing ten delegates to represent York county in a State Democratic convention to be held in the city of Columbia on the 20TH DAY OF MAY, 1896, and for the transaction of such other and further business as may properly come before said county convention.

The delegates and alternates to the county convention will be elected by ballot, and, for the purpose of conducting the precinct elections, the member of the executive committee, or president or vice president of each precinct club will appoint in writing three managers of election, who shall open the polls at their respective precincts on SATURDAY, MAY 2, 1896, at 1 o'clock, p. m., and keep them open until 5 p. m. The persons voted for as delegates and receiving the highest number of votes, shall be declared delegates and those voted for as alternates and receiving the highest number of votes, shall be declared alternates.

Managers of election will send up to the secretary of the executive committee, their written appointment and also certificates of election of delegates and alternates, which certificates must be signed by the president and secretary of the precinct club.

Under the law of the State all managers of election must, before entering upon the discharge of their duties take and subscribe to the effect on the way will fairly, honestly and impartially conduct the election according to the rules of the Democratic party and the provisions of an Act to Protect Primary Elections and the Election of Delegates, etc.

At the said precinct elections, all persons known to be Democrats shall be entitled to vote.

Managers will administer to each voter an oath to the effect that he is qualified to vote in this election and has not before voted therein.

Under the constitution of the party, the convention has the right to increase or diminish the representation from any precinct. The new precincts of Smyrna and Ebenezer may elect delegates to this convention, that is to say 1 delegate for every 25 names on their club roll and 1 for every majority fraction thereof.

Each precinct will at its meeting on the said 2ND DAY OF MAY, proximo, elect one of its members to serve on the executive committee for next two years.

The basis of representation is the vote cast in the first primary in 1894. The delegates from the various precincts, therefore, apportioned as follows, to wit:
