The Richmond Republic, of the 15th inst., says. The wheat crop in the Valley is said to be good, but in every other portion of the State it is a complete failure. The grain is defective from the effects of rust and exposure to the constant rains of the past ten months, and, in addition, the quantity of cheat cockle, and onion issunusually large. Notwithstanding its inferior quality, it is bringing good prices in this city, the most inferior commanding \$1.80 to \$2, and the better qualities from \$2.20 to \$2.25 per bashel. The money value of the crop in the State, excepting the Shenandoah Valley, of which section we know nothing, except upon unreliable reports, will not be more than one-twentieth of that of 1860.
