During the year ending October 31, 1872, the sum of \$118,787 was paid out for schools, and the present deficiency for school purposes is \$300,000. The Taxes.

Representatives W. H. Wallace and Meetze made a sensible and practical fight against the proposal to levy a tax of five mills to pay the deficiencies in the appropriations of previous years. Their platform was substantially the same as that of THE NEWS, viz., that every just debt must be paid, but that the people should not be called on to pay for deficiencies until they have been informed in detail, of the nature of those deficiencies, how they arose, and whether they represent debts for which the State is morally as well as legally liable. The deficiency bill, however, was passed by a vote of 68 to 43. The minority vote was cheeringly large, as there are only twenty-three Conservatives in the House.

There is still plenty of work for the mi nority to do. They have been defeated is the first engagement, but they may still serve the taxpaying public by advocating such amendments to the tax law as will make the payment of taxes easy to the people. It is idle to say that it is more convenient to pay the State taxes in one lump, in January, than to pay half in January and half in June. Take the case of the thousands of persons who make neither cotton ner corn, and who, nevertheless, pay their quota of taxes. Take the case of the professional men, or those who have fixed whole or the half? That is the question. In Manuary all manner of bills have to be paid. It is a hard season of the year for persons of small means. And it is proposed to crush them, by squeezing from them, within thirty days, one and a half per cent. upon everything they possess. Divide it out 1. The State tax is for the expenses of a year, not of a month. Let it be paid in in-stalments, and the people will not complain. This is done in Charleston, without inconvenience, and unless there is some swindle in the back ground, the Legislature will require the State to do it also.

Ele the Game Worth the Candle?

The report of the receipts and payments for the year ending October 31, 1872, just submitted to the General Assembly, is instructive reading for the taxpayers, and suggests the inquiry whether such a government as that which we enjoy in South Carolina is worth a tithe of what it costs.

As usual the most startling item is the charge for legislative expenses. During the year there were paid out, under this head. \$541,267, and the message of Governor Moses informs the public that pay certificates amounting to \$320,000 are still outstanding. The grand total, therefore, is \$861,267, exclusive of the charges for currentand permanent printing. Before the war the Legislature cost \$40,000 a session. The difference between that sum and \$861,267 ments the difference between the republicanism of 1860 and the mobocracy of 1872. In the General Assembly of 1871-72 there were 32 senators and 124 representatives. The length of the session was about ninety days. The pay of the members was six dollars a day, and twenty cents mileage. The pay of each member was, therefore, \$540. Adding thereto mileage for three hundred miles, \$60, the entire cost of each member should have been \$600, and the entire cost of the session for pay and mileage, should have been \$93, 600. The difference between this sum and the \$861,267, actually paid or due, represents the arrears of some previous session, the cost of attaches and the miscellaneous stealing. What State can beat this? From no State, in proportion to its means, has as much been stolen as from South Carolina.

It is proposed to examine the outstanding pay certificates, and the Attorney-General has been instructed to prosecute any persons whom he may find guilty of embezzlement or of raising money, upon the credit of the State, without authority of law. These measures, if vigorously pushed, may save a little, and the conviction of a brace of peculating officials would undoubtedly deter new-comers from following in the footsteps of their predecessors. There would be stealing; of course; but by retail instead of by wholesale. It is not nearly as pleasant to live at the public expense in the Penitentiary as to revel in luxury, upon public plunder, in Columbia or Brooklyn.

The Judgeship of the Fifth Circuit.

Judge R. B. Carpenter, who resigned his seat on the bench as Judge of this Circult when nominated as the candidate for Governor of the Union Reform party in 1870, was elected yesterday the Judge of the Fifth Circuit, in the place of Judge Melton, elected Attorney-General.
