**Brevet Nigger**—The Illinois State Register says that during the war, the quartermaster's department, instructed by the nigger-loving authority at Washington, paid negro teamsters twenty-five dollars per month and rations, while white soldiers detailed for duty as teamsters, were only paid sixteen dollars and rations. An Illinois soldier put on duty as mule whacker, sent a written application to his Captain, "to be promoted as nigger by brevet, and asking that the President order him on duty, with pay in accordance with his rank."

A reporter for a London paper wrote the verdict of a coroner's jury, "died from hemorrhage," and the public gained the information the next day that the deceased "died from her marriage." This is on a par with the experience of a reporter in a Detroit paper, who, in an article on the city poor, spoke of the great number of persons reduced to poverty by the "mysterious decrees of Providence." The Commission will sit without regard to hours; will thoroughly examine into the allegations made; will be authorized to call for persons and papers, and will take evidence; will afford all reasonable facilities to the party interested to present his counter allegations and testimony; and will report the proofs, with expression of opinion thereon and recommendation of action, if any are deemed needful, with reasons therefor.

The Commanding Officer Post of Columbia will provide needful facilities for the accommodation of the Commission. Publicity will be given to this order.
