Cable Despatches.

PARIS, November 7.—Ex-Queen Isabella is here.

BRUSSELS, November 7.—A Madrid correspondent of the *Independence Belge*, writes that the provisional government will not entertain propositions for the sale of Cuba.

LONDON, November 7.—Accounts have been received of the annihilation of the Portuguese expedition in Mozambique, South Africa. It consisted of 600 soldiers, with artillery; but sixty escaped to the coast—the natives captured everything.

BERLIN, November 7.—The ministry introduced a bill confiscating the property of the Elector of Hesse.

Election Returns.

WILMINGTON, November 7.—Returns are sufficient to show that the State has gone for Grant by a considerable majority, though the Conservatives made large gains. Returns received from the mountain district to-night show the election of Plato Dnrham, Conservative, to Congress. The delegation will stand five Republicans, two Conservatives—a Democratic gain of one.

AUGUSTA, November 7.—Additional returns continue to increase the Democratic majority. From present indications, it will reach 40,000.

A special despatch from Lexington, Ky., states that Barnes, Republican, carried the Eighth Kentucky District by two thousand.

CHARLESTON, November 7.—Arrived—ship N. Mosher, New York. Sailed—steamer Champion, New York.

WASHINGTON, November 7.—The naturalization treaty with Bavaria has been officially proclaimed.

McCulloch decides that he has the power to re-issue legal tenders redeemed but not cancelled, provided the amount outstanding don't exceed \$400,000,000.

The complexion of the next Congress will be: 57 Republicans to 11 Democrats; House 142 to 83.

The latest despatches from Minister Johnson do not indicate that the details for the settlement of the old bank claims have assumed a definite shape. Negotiations for the right of way over the Isthmus of Darien are progressing favorably. Seward and the Columbian minister are in accord.

McCulloch has ordered a re-issue of \$10,000,000 at three per cent., as a temporary loan to relieve the money market.

Customs receipts from the 25th to the 31st inclusive, \$2,665,000.

Private despatches at Memphis state that Clayton has declared martial law in eleven counties in Arkansas.

HARRISBURG, November 7.—Gen. Grant is here, en route to Washington. He merely bowed his thanks to the cheers of the crowd to whom he was introduced.

LYNCHBURG, VA., November 7.—The national bank and two large commission houses were burnt this morning, on Main street.

HAVANA, November 7.—Late advices from Mexico state that Gen. Mier y Teran has arrived. The grand jury has found a true bill. Another Yucatan insurrection is apprehended. Maximilian's confessor, with the presents from the Emperor of Austria for the lawyers who defended Maximilian has arrived.

Congress has passed a bill allowing all persons to carry arms.

Escobedo commenced operations against the rebels in Tamalipas.

TALLAHASSEE, FLA., November 7.—About 9 o'clock, last night, citizens to the number of 100 or more, were summoned by the city and County authorities to hold themselves in readiness to aid in quelling any riot. At 11 there were no indications of trouble, and the posse were discharged. The cause of the call was conflicting orders from Gov. Reed and Lieut. Gov. Gleason, and fears were entertained that the colored people will be called to support the action of the Legislature. The Legislature adjourned this morning, till January. There was no quorum present. When impeachment passed, several members held their seats and voted, whose seats had been decided vacant by the proclamation of the Governor. By reason of members accepting and occupying other offices, Gov. Reed refuses to recognize the action of the body, and declares it illegal. Lieut. Gov. Gleason, this morning, demanded possession of the Executive Mansion and was refused by Gov. Reed, who has brought suit against Gleason and Alden, Secretary of State, and Circuit Judge, for conspiring against the government, and they are now under arrest. This case will be sent up to the Supreme Court. The general impression seems to be that Reed is in the right.
